





'OTHER' included hearing about the project through school (132 of respondents), as well as through work, the banners posted, the and the radio (each under 5 respondents).






Respondents also mentioned ideas for *longer term* outreach including required airline/hotel videos (10 respondents) and having a ranger/check-in station, charging users, making an activities center, and cultural sensitivity training (each under 3 respondents). Sentiments of not advertising to the public at all and restricting the park to locals only were also shared (each under 3 respondents).

- Most supported driving on the beach or were concerned and interested in making it more respectful/safe (36) while some thought there should be no driving on the beach (11)
- o Protection of the dunes (41)

- Provide education to park users (29)
- Increased enforcement (25)


• Many respondents wanted to keep camping on the beach (3), others wanted more camping permits available (2), no camping (2), or camping for locals only (1)

- Some mentioned that the park should be for locals only (4) while others mentioned that there were too many tourists or the tourists were disrespectful (4), and that there should not be any more enforcement of locals (1)
- Decisions should be made by Native Hawaiians (5)
- o Importance of boat ramp/access (2)
- o There should not be homeless people there (1)

"I grew up being told stories of where not to go and certain places that were considered a "heiau" or temple."

"I was taught by my Tutu and great Aunties and Uncle about this place. We have sacred ties to the <u>hula pa</u>, freshwater springs, <u>fishing sites</u> and the <u>dunes</u> at Polihale."

"There used to be lots of spring water that would flow through Polihale."

"Leina-a-ke-akua, place where the spirits leaped in to the nether world."

"Pahapaha grows in the waters near Polihale. A wreath' made from pahapaha can fade and dry out, but when soaked in water, it will revive to its original freshness. Only the pahapaha from Polihale does this. According to mythology, Na-maka-o-Kaha'i, sister of Pele and Goddess of the Ocean, blessed Polihale's pahapaha with this special quality."


"I know that there are a lot of <u>burials</u> at Polihale and the reason being that when the sun set in the west it signified the ending of life so a lot of Native ancestors were buried down there, and the winter waves would eventually take the bones out to Po 'Āina."










ARE YOU AWARE OF THE POLIHALE STATE PARK RULES?

DRIVING ON THE BEACH


Respondents also offered some specific recommendations about camping and access management:

- More enforcement (11)
- Control driving on the beach
 (8)
- More education and signage (7)
- Keep the park open (5)

Other recommendations with less than 5 responses included adding boardwalks for the hot sand, improving the access road, adding a green fee, no use of pesticides and herbicides in the park, intermittent closure, and more bathrooms.

"I remember when it was empty, quiet, and clean. As far as my eyes could see, I was surrounded by sand, a mountain and a glimmering blue clear ocean."


"Creating lots of family memories with my children. Fishing, diving, surfing, camping. Teaching them to take care of the land and learn how to provide for the 'Ohana."


OTHER RESPONSES:

 - New York examples including the Hamptons, Montauk Point, Fire Island, and Long Island (3)






