Opening statement


I Dwight J. Vicente will be representing The Hawaiian Kingdom in this contested case hearing. This is my opening statement. On behalf of this Kingdom, jurisdiction, land title, Treaties, rights of Nationals of this Kingdom, should be protected by this Kingdom. Riki May Amano is as a matter of law not qualified to be a Hearings Officer in this case, she is after all a Japanese National. Japan’s occupied by the U.S. after WW II and U.S. Army General Douglas Mac Arthur wrote Japan’s Constitution that is still in effect today. In the Hawaii Tribune Herald Saturday August 13, 2016, page A7 “Their View”, the Emperor plays defense on Japans Constitution, Bloomberg View. Japan is one of the countries that make up the proposed TMT project, and yet Japan is also under the Northwest Ordinance of 1787. Riki May Amano has a conflict of interest and there for is disqualified. The Treaty between the Hawaiian Kingdom and Japan ended in 1897. She granted (“PUEO”) motion to limit the issues to five issues and all fall under Article 4 Sec. 3 Clause 2 of the U.S. Constitution. The Territory it speaks of, deals only with the Ohio River Valley, Article 5 of the Northwest Ordinance. It was set when the U.S. Constitution was adopted in 1791. There is no means to amend Article 5 of that Ordinance to include Crown and Government Lands of this Kingdom to be annexed in 1898 by Article 4 Sec.

3 Clause 2 of the U.S. Constitution. The Reciprocity Treaty of 1875 as amended in 1887 is based on that Ordinance. It placed this Kingdom into a Protectorate Status, Peacock & co. v. Rep. Haw. 12 Haw.40, this violates the U.S. Constitution. U.S. Citizens in this Kingdom demanded their rights, Home stead Act of 1884, the right to Arm themselves, Honolulu Rifles, the right to vote, 1887 Constitution forced on to King Kalakaua, and the amendment to the 1875 Treaty of Reciprocity to station the U.S. Navy at Pearl River in Oahu. On January 17, 1893 Queen Liliuokalani filed a protest against U.S. Minister Steven's for removing her by force and replacing her with a provisional government made up of U.S. Citizens. This unconstitutional act, has yet to be heard in the U.S. Supreme Court Article III Sec. II Clause II. In 1894 the Republic of Hawaii tried to rename the Crown and Government lands of this Kingdom to be public lands. In 1898 the U.S. claim to annex Crown and Government Kingdom lands to Article 5 of the Northwest Ordinance 1787, the Ohio River Valley. The U.S. Congress by a Joint resolution July 7, 1898 (30 Stat. 750), excepted the stolen lands and also continued the Reciprocity Treaty of 1875 as amended in 1887, this Treaty is still in effect today. The U.S. Congress has no authority to continue a Treaty under Article 4 Sec. 3 Clause 2. These lands are now controlled by the Congress and the President through the U.S. Dept. of Interior. Congress in 1900 created the Territory of Hawaii, Walter F. Frear appointed Governor in 1909, created the Forest Reserve/Conservation lands, and in 1920 U.S. Congress created the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, by renaming the lands Congress assumed jurisdiction over these lands in violation of Article 1 Sec. 8 Clause 17 U.S. Constitution, as these acts are those of the Northwest Ordinance. The Territory of Hawaii wrote the State Constitution in 1950. Article 1 Sec. 3 Clause 3 require that to be a Senator, you are required to be a Citizen of that State for 9 years, this raises the question, when did the State of Hawaii come in to being? In 1959 in the Admission Act.

Congress claim to have created and admitted the State of Hawaii by Sec. 4 Compact into the union on an equal footing, this is because of Article 4 Sec. 3 Clause 2 of the U.S. Constitution. Because All 5 issues set by (“PUEO”) are the means to usurp power over this Kingdom’s Crown and Government lands as to the history I’ve stated, these are all questions of Constitutional law violations that needs to be heard in a Court of Competent Jurisdiction.
