ABOVE THE CLOUDS.

A Few Facts About Mauna Kea.
13,825 Feet Above Hilo.
(Hawaii Herald.)

In climbing Mauna Kea, which is 13,825 feet in height, the mamame trees are not seen above an elevation of 10,000 feet, and the raillardia, the only remaining form of vegetation, disappears at 11,500 feet. There are a few plants, however, which grow around the shores of Waiau lake, at an elevation of 13,100 feet, but on no other portion of the mountain above 11,500 feet.

On the edge of the plateau are several pyramids of stone, which were erected to commemorate the visit of Queen Emma, and at an elevation of 12,000 feet is Keanakakoi, the famous quarry opened by the natives many centuries ago for the manufacture of battle axes.

At an elevation of nearly 13,000 feet there is a burying ground, where ancient chiefs were laid to rest.

The trade winds blow on the summit, although the anti-trades have been supposed by some to appear much below 14,000 feet.

Ice forms every night on Lake Waiau. Spiders, butterflies and flies are found on the summit, though there is apparently nothing to support life.

It is not considered safe to make the trip unless the horses are extra well shod, as the lava is so sharp and so hard that if a shoe is lost the horse's foot is badly cut in a few minutes, and neither force nor persuasion will induce such an animal to travel unshod. As there is nothing by the wayside to support life, near the summit, it has often been found necessary to kill crippled horses.

Artesian Wells.

The McCandless Bros. have just finished their twelfth well at Spreckelsville and will this week take the rig to Haiku, where a considerable contract awaits. The twentieth well has been completed at Lahaina and the rig goes to Molokai, making the second rig in the service of the American Sugar Company.

LIFE ON MAUI

Achi and Blaisdell Making
Land Inspection.

Senator Hocking at Work—Nahiku
—Paia's Debating Club—Teach-
ers Meet—The Weather.

MAUI, April 15, 1899.—Last evening the Makawao Debating Society held its regular monthly discussion in the parlors of the Paia For Ign Church. The question at issue was "Resolved that war is beneficial to a nation." Messrs. Chas. W. Baldwin and William Beckwith debated in the affirmative and Messrs W. S. Nicoll and Geo. Baldwin in the negative.

The vote on the question by the audience stood 8 to 5 in favor of the negative. Some complaint is made that auditors vote according to their preconceived opinions and not in accordance with the preponderance of argument presented. The subject of the next debate is "Resolved, that the contract labor system is not beneficial to the best interests of Hawaii."

Monday afternoon, the 10th, twelve teachers met in the Makawao school-house, the occasion being the regular monthly meeting. Mr. W. C. Crook discussed several chapters of "Parker's Talks." Rain prevented a large attendance.

Senator Alfred Hocking visited Kahului and Nahiku during the week. He met the different owners of Nahiku lands and got their signatures to agreements between planters and the Nahiku Sugar Co.

Today, the 15th, Miss Mary Alexander departs for California via Honolulu. She has been visiting her relations at Haiku and Kaluanui.

On the 14th, Charles Achi, William Blaisdell and party landed at Kihel and after viewing the plantation went to Wailuku. On Monday, the 17th, the party will ride to Nahiku intending to make a tour of the new plantation lands there.

W. O. Aiken of Hamakua has been quite sick with intermittent fever. He is now much better.

Not Blood Poisoning.

Paia, Maui, April 12, 1899.
EDITOR P. C. A.:—Kindly correct the erroneous report in which it was stated that Mr. Thomas Campbell of Paia, died of blood poisoning.

The fact is that Mr. Campbell had suffered for several years from heart trouble from which he died about thirty-six hours after the operation, in which his arm was amputated.

At no time before or after the operation was there any symptoms of blood poisoning, although from the condition of the arm when first injured, that result was feared and carefully guarded against.

At the time of death the arm stump and adjacent parts presented a perfectly healthy appearance.
