DOFAW Staff works to improve Public Hunting Areas

There are approximately 916,000 acres of public hunting land in Hawaii, and a lot of labor goes into keeping those public hunting areas usable each year. Division of Forestry and Wildlife staff work on many ongoing projects that improve public hunting areas and game habitat.

Signs, markers, and gates need to be repaired or replaced. New hunter check stations are installed. DOFAW collects hunter data from the check stations to analyze game trends, and makes an effort to look for places to expand hunter opportunity. Staff also conduct field and aerial surveys throughout the year to keep track of game populations.

Take a look at some of the numbers for public hunting areas statewide where DOFAW staff were working from July 1, 2017 to December 31, 2018!



1,594 Hunter Check Station inspections

Staff inspects the 71 hunter check stations regularly to repair any damage and control surrounding vegetation.



358 Miles of roadside/trails maintained

Roadside and trail upkeep ensures that roads and trails in hunting areas remain accessible to the public.



666 Bird water unit inspections

Over 120 gamebird water units enhance habitat for the birds to increase their presence in public hunting areas.



945 Acres mowed for gamebird habitat

Strip mowing helps increase gamebird species carrying capacity by providing desirable habitat.






Hunting Stamp Contest Winners
