The main air attack was directed over and through Ewa. Our house was located across Renton Road from the managers house and received bullet holes from enemy air craft.


My father Dr. Garton E. Wall, was the plantation doctor, and the events as I remember as a 3&1/2 year old follow.

My Mom and Dad were in town for Saturday night, and remained over night at my Grandparents house.

My sister and I spent the night with a Japanese family on the plantation. When the attack occurred, June left her family, as her boy's were older, and took my sister and myself to the hospital. Dad and Mom returned to the hospital, and along with June, we lived in my Dads office for the first week of the war.

I was not aware of what was really going on, but I remember the staff that was there, running all over the place, and my sister sleeping in the bottom drawer of a dresser in the library room of his office.

I am proud of my Ewa Plantation roots. My licence plate reads ~~FWA~~BORN, and I am a Pearl Harbor Survivor.
