Re: Traditional Cultural Place/Property Nomination for the summit region of Mauna Kea

#### Aloha HPRB members:

I am a former board member of the HPRB, director of the Heritage Management MA program at UH Hilo, an anthropology professor at UH Hilo for the last 26 years who regularly teaches classes in cultural resource management, and a former staff member of a State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO), the Massachusetts Historical Commission. Much of my own research over the last two decades has been on the upper slopes of Mauna Kea through investigations of the Mauna Kea Adze Quarry in the Ka'ohe district and nineteenth century ranching sites in the Humu'ula district. I write to you today in full support of KAHEA's Traditional Cultural Place designation for the upper slopes of Mauna Kea with a boundary at 6500 ft. asl. A unifying justification for this TCP boundary is the existence of all these summit regions within the "Wao akua" (realm of the gods) in Hawaiian cosmology, or the region above the dense forests that occupy the mid-slopes of Mauna Kea.

Although TCP nominations have been relatively uncommon in Hawai'i compared with historic architecture (usually nominated under criteria A, and/or B, and C) and archaeological sites (usually nominated under Criterion D), the National Park Service and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation provide specific guidelines for evaluating the suitability of traditional cultural place nominations (which can often include all criteria A through D, as the Mauna Kea summit region does). The main guidelines are found in National Register Bulletin 38 "Guidelines for Evaluating and Documenting Tradtional Cultural Places," first published in 1990. In 1992 the guidelines were revised to encourage more consideration of indigenous sacred areas with *intangible characteristics* such as Mauna Kea. Beginning in 2014 and continuing to the present, the NPS has been circulating a revised draft of the guidelines that provides clearer language and more case-study examples of just what should be considered a TCP, with the most current draft in circulation from the NPS being dated to October 27, 2022. While many HPRB members may be used to boundary justifications for historic properties drawn around tangible human constructs, TCP boundaries are instead justified by patterns of traditional and customary practices by living communities, and tend to be much more expansive.

Both the 1992 revisions to Bulletin 38 and the new draft bulletin language support broad boundary justifications through the case examples they provide. These examples include the Helkau Historic District in northern California where topographic lines were used to define a broad area used for the collection of medicinal material. In Wyoming, Medicine Wheel/Medicine Mountain NHL consists of a single tangible medicine wheel feature, with the surrounding 4,080 acres of storied natural parts of the landscape included in the boundaries. In southern California, Kuchamaa (Tecate Peak) is a sacred mountain to the Kumeyaay, and boundaries to the TCP are drawn at the 3,000 ft. contour (see NPS Bulletin entitled "Defining Boundaries for National Register Properties" for the last example).

The 2022 UH recommendations for the Mauna Kea summit region limit TCP designations to 3 circumscribed portions of the summit region (sites 50-10-23-21438 [Kūkahauʻula], 50-1-23-21439 [Pu'u Līlīnoe], and 50-1-23-21440 [Lake Waiau]). In my opinion and based on Bulletin 38 and the NPS bulletin "Defining Boundaries for National Register Properties," these circumscribed boundaries exclude many aspects of cultural practice on the upper mountain from consideration of traditional and customary practices, including burial, astronomical observation, umbilical cord placement, and various ongoing ritual practice, all of which are amply covered in the nomination before you, and that justify the boundaries proposed in the current nomination.
