Project presented by: David Shideler, Cultural Surveys Hawaii, Inc.; Lani Maa Lapilio, Aukahi; Clifford Lau, Division Chief for Facilities, C&C Honolulu

Also in audience R. Teo Clemens, Kualoa Regional Park director

Shideler: on going consultation with 15 parties, long-term associated with the park

- Interest expressed about condition of interment facility which has existed since 1993
- Recent photo distributed taken in 2016
- Council member D. Holck did a site visit recently

Ehrhorn and Fermantez: great photos, shows the current condition of the vault location

Shideler: 4 iwi found during AIS and subsequent data recover

- 2 cranial frags in neighboring location at East Beach/Mokolii, subject to much erosion
- During data recovery, find of an ulna fragment in East Beach area
- Associated with fragmented iwi in the past as well as burials eroding out
- Runway developed there was over a mile long, 6000 ft. x 150 ft. wide
  - Significance disturbance and discovery of iwi during that project
  - Bomber runway
- Southwest portion of park
  - Find of a nearly complete human mandible

- No one has come forward to the burial notice
- In 1993, there was recognition of lineal descendants for the project
  - Gladys Pualoa Ahua – asked for recovery of iwi and reinterment to existing burial crypt

Honua Consulting introduced the project: Rose Thurman, Kehau Watson, Matt Sproat

(PowerPoint presentation)

Thurman: (summary) small parcel in Waikiki, privately owned by Mark Smith of Cooper Enterprises

- small AIS investigation
- a number of shallow utilities, large grease trap excavation
- AIS investigation focused on the one excavation extending below 2.75 ft., as all other utilities are shallow
- excavated 14 x 8 x 6 ft deep unit right on top of grease trap excavation
  - found: fill layers, SIHP -7930
    - SIHP -7930: dark cultural layer with underlying enriched wetland sediments; both layers contained historic and traditional artifacts, and disarticulated human skeletal remains
- AIS report was accepted yesterday by the SIHP
  - extensive background research
  - project area is in Kamookahi/Mookahi, used in 1890s to 1915 for rice or banana, purchased in 1916 as a land grant
  - located in a marshland-type environment
  - area was filled in during the early 1920’s during the Waikiki land reclamation and became part of the city blocks
  - picture and profile of layers from AIS
    - burial finds are pedestaled in the excavation
    - 5 burial find areas: cranial fragments, teeth, finger and toe bones, clavicle and a large portion of a pelvis
    - excavated unit is tightly situated between two buildings
- Honua Consulting initiated consultation
  - burial notices placed in Star Advertiser and Ka Wai Ola
  - this is the second OIBC
  - two consultation letters, two on-site consultations with descendants
  - preference for relocation
  - City determined that this is the only location for the grease trap
  - site extends in every direction, likelihood of encountering additional iwi through further excavation is high
  - BTP has three options:
    - on-site reinterment near the burial find location
      - preferred, area is secure,
      - could have native landscaping and a memorial stone
      - asked to pre-test proposed vault area



hand-excavation to 87 cm below surface, which is the start of the cultural layer

Kaanohi: Is there a lock on that gate?

Thurman: Yes.

Mitchell: Looks to be near some utilities.

Thurman: This is the main entry into and from the building for gas, water, electric. Lots of utilities surrounding the area. The spot itself is pretty clear.

- off site at an established burial preserve  
secured, well-known, well-treated area  
in consultation, this was not preferable
- within a soil bench in the excavation  
directly in line where the utilities would go  
pros: near the original location of discovery and within the site  
cons: would be adjacent to the grease trap and could be subject to maintenance issues, less desirable

Kehau: There are utilities lines that go right into the site area.

SHPD made multiple visits to the site.

Moving the grease trap excavation would have potentially exposed additional iwi.

Looked for the closest possible area on site.

Secure area, no pedestrian walkway, will be gated.

Hand excavation to clean sand, sizable enough to house an encasement

In addition to Aunty Paulette and Mana, a member of the Keohokalole spoke with Honua

First letter, consultation, second letter and additional consultation,

Comfortable with the input received, but it's up to the OIBC to make the decision.

Mitchell: Restaurants?

Thurman: Two restaurants in one building.

Kehau: It's not a huge restaurant.

Ehrhorn: So the reason you're doing this project is that two restaurants need a grease trap?

Thurman: And utilities.

Ehrhorn: Any other comments?

Holck: You mentioned there would be landscaping, who would take care of the landscaping?

Thurman: That would be the responsibility of the landowner.

Amaral: And that would be something in writing to the landowner, subject to our approval or part of the project approval process?

Thurman: Yes, part of the Burial Treatment Plan and part of the Burial Site Component as well.

Amaral: Would we approve the type of plants? Ti?

Thurman: We did discuss using native vegetation, it's open to whatever people feel is most appropriate for that area.

Amaral: Do you have a design as to what it's going to look like?

Thurman: We do not have a landscaping plan for that area

Verbal arrangement that that would be a good location

Amaral: Headstone?

Thurman: Memorial stone?

Not really a design

Open with talking to people and getting their input

Watson: Didn't want to get presumptuous

Not our decision to make regarding one of the options

Landowner has been accommodating

Sproat: Regarding the vegetation, there's ti leaf and aliipoe there right now.

That's always been the vegetation there

Fermantez: How much future excavation?

Thurman: All shallow utilities will be dealt with under a monitoring plan.

If remains at the base of the grease trap are determined to be moved, there will need to be some hand digging to go deeper within the clean sand to lay the base course utility foundation

Fermantez: Could it be too early to determine the plan for these if you find more?

Thurman: Have excavated down into the site, and are into clean sand. Slit trenches through as well.

Very yellow, sterile

Right at water table

Highly confident that if any further excavation is necessary into that sand, it will be sterile and there will be no more human remains

Ehrhorn: But if you do find something.....

Thurman: During monitoring or activities like that, it would be preferably in the same location.

Ehrhorn: How many sets of iwi were found?

Thurman: The minimum number of individuals would be 1, there were no duplicate bones, lots of fragments

Ehrhorn: One individual, disturbed previously.

Any other comments from OIBC members?

*None offered*

Any comments from the public?

Kaanohi: There was an area that you didn't want to do any more probing or find any more fragments, where was that?

Thurman: So if we were to expand in any direction from the excavation, the brown layer extends in all directions and that is where we would expect to find more.

Kaanohi: In that deposit.

Fermantez: So you're one of the recognized cultural descendants?

Kaanohi: Just today, and Mana is the other one.

Watson: And Adrian Keohokalole, he's the other one we consulted.

Kaanohi: Adrian is recognized for other areas.

Ehrhorn: You wanted to say something else, though?

Kaanohi: So because these remains were found during the AIS, they are previously identified?

Thurman: Yes.

Kaanohi: I couldn't recall that being mentioned before.

Ehrhorn: How do you feel about the three options? Do you like number one best?

Kaanohi: I want to keep the fragments as close to where they are now; they dug to the sand area where the vault will go and they don't plan to go in that area to disturb it again.

Ehrhorn: So where do you go from here? What's your next step?

Watson: You tell us.

Thurman: We're asking for your determination.

Ehrhorn: And our choices are to choose one of those options. One thing that I'd like to see which came up earlier are what will the final location be and how will it look? Usually we have landscape drawings that show the plant materials and things that were worked out with the families that were involved. I think we would like to see that. We can probably make a decision today on one of the options anyway. Mana?

Mana: Mana Kaleilani Caceres, 'ohana was recognized to these iwi kupuna today.

We would be most comfortable with option 1 also

Actively monitoring other sites

Grease trap excavations tend to be bigger than they (sic) start out to be

Food scraps and other materials would be going into this area

Would only be comfortable with leaving the kupuna there if the grease trap wasn't there

Working together with the consultant and other descendants to a workable solution

Ehrhorn: It's a historic building, pretty minimal future construction.

In case it does happen, there are protections there of some sort

Fermantez: So the grease trap is going to fit within the current excavation

Thurman: We excavated it wide enough and deep enough; it's a pre-cast grease trap so it's going to fit right in there.

Ehrhorn: Any other comments from the council?

Mitchell: When I read of Option 3, what came mind was *moelepo*.

I support our descendants' mana'o for option 1.

Kaanohi: Also, when I went to the site visit, I wanted to be sure there's a large enough area so that if more iwi are found, they can all fit in that one location.

Ehrhorn: And you're comfortable with that?

Kaanohi: yes.

Fermantez: Where are the future utilities?
