#### **IV. OLD BUSINESS**

##### **A. Discussion Regarding Archaeological Inventory Survey for the United States Coast Guard Wailupe Family Housing District, located in Waikīkī Ahupua‘a, Kona District, Island of O‘ahu, TMK: (1) 3-5-046:013.**

**Recording: 3:52-23:05**

- Mara Mulrooney-Family housing project for the Coast Guard planned for demo due to health concerns. Section 106 process in motion, will only target super structures. Pacific Legacy is conducting AIS for the project. Waiialae is nearby once awarded to alii nui Abner Paki. No LCA awards in project area and 23 kuleana claims in Waiaale iki. Military acquired land for a Navy radio station before being taken over by the coast guard. After 1950's the fishponds were filled. 11 past archaeological studies in the area with multiple burials identified in the vicinity of the project area. Puu Honua O Wailupe malamas the archaeological sites including iwi kupuna in the area. Here to hear mana'o on AIS testing strategy. 17 test trenches excavated with a backhoe and 3 test pits in areas with coral sediment. Held a consultation meeting with stakeholders and descendants. Developed a work plan and hoping to proceed with AIS fieldwork in June.
- Member Erhorn-What is the future of the property? Would be good to have an idea. Have had past reviews where the landowner wants to know what is located on property to be able to sell the land.
- Mara Mulrooney-No current plans. As part of the work plan, a proactive plan of action has been developed.
- Member Ako-Would appreciate more info on who acquired the land and the situation behind it. Concerned about trees brought in, they should be honored and respected regardless but are they native trees?
- Member Mills-Wish the USCG would know what they're doing with the property. If inadvertents are discovered and they're preserved in place it could affect future plans.
- Chair Caceres-If at a later time than conclusion of demo and USCG decides to build, would it require another AIS?
- Susan Lebo-There was an agreement document meant to restore these buildings and theyve decided that wasn't possible due to safety. No plan to dispose of the property. Current AIS is focused on buildings that need to be addressed due to safety issues. If they decide to build down the road, the project would still come to SHPD for review.
- Member Mills-Would like to review the NAGPRA plan of action when its ready.

##### **B. Discussion Regarding Archaeological Inventory Survey for the HECO Extension to 690 Pohukaina Street, Honolulu Ahupua‘a, Kona District, Island of O‘ahu, TMK: (1) 2-1-051:999 (Coral Street ROW and Pohukaina Street ROW).**

**Recording: 23:05-30:25**

- Mara Mulrooney-AIS for HECO extension. Located in Kakaako, project involved installation of 800ft of electrical duct lines. Historically a culturally significant area with fishponds and saltworks. 48 past archaeological studies within 300m of the project area. Proposing 5 test trenches with backhoe excavation equaling 5% of the project area. Trench base depth at level of water table. Continuing consultation with stakeholders.
- Chair Caceres-5% is minimal acceptable standard for an AIS. Should iwi kupuna be encountered, ask that its not similar to the KS project from the past.
- Alani Opio-This is on the project proponent, not Hawaiian Electric.
- Mara Mulrooney-The project proponent is Warn Partners (sp?) and High Range

- Mara Mulrooney-Pacific Legacy has been assisting with the care of iwi kupuna at the beach park. Following the Kona low storm, we assisted SHPD with the shoreline walk. Met with Traven Apiki to update him on the current state of fairs.
- Chair Caceres-Any assistance the OIBC can offer to expedite the reburial process.
- Mara Mulrooney-Regina was working closely with an employee of the beach park to schedule a time to kanu. Traven has been put in touch with Will.
- Member Erhorn-We used to always have a representative from the parks department that sat on the council.
- Member Ako-Seems to have been a switch in involvement with C&C of Honolulu. Are the vaults permanent?
- Mara Mulrooney-There is a permanent vault in the center of the park. Since that time there has been a shift in active descendants in the area and the approach to protect iwi kupuna. There are protected iwi kupuna on the shoreline but it goes against the BTP.
- Chair Caceres-Struggling to find role in remedying this situation. Any longterm storage of iwi kupuna is a concern.

**E. Discussion Regarding the Archaeological Inventory Survey of the Private Residence Sunshade Roof Project at 61-769 Pāpa‘iloa Rd. Kawailoa Ahupua‘a, Waialua District, Island of O‘ahu, TMK: (1) 6-1-004:087.**

**Recording: 38:32-49:36**

- Chair Caceres-Received call from Traven, during 2nd Kona storm the trench flooded. Iwi were pedastaled within the trench and the iwi were washed out. Unsure if they are still in the trench. SCS made the effort to recover the iwi and was unable to find the two individuals. There was concern by the contractor that the house was going to collapse into the trench and would be backfilled with concrete. Requested someone from SCS present and Mike responded that he was unable to attend today because he's at the Maui IBC meeting. Intend to reach out to deputy AG on what role the OIBC has in the future. Believe we should explore every option to protect the iwi kupuna even if we're unsure where they may be.
- Member Ako-Would caution against a presentation that isn't open to the public.
- Chair Caceres-Understanding is that the existing foundation was failing being adjacent to the trench.
- Member Ako-What permitting process was involved in this happening. The area is having similar issues related to foundations. Red flag the situation is being used to circumvent the process.
- Susan Lebo-Not aware of filling with concrete but was aware that they wanted to fill it. They're indicating the foundation is in danger of collapse because the trench is open. Mike Dega went out to assess the situation and recover the iwi, was apparent the whole area had flooded. Homeowner is concerned of house being undermined and collapsing and they would like to close the trench. Don't have any of the information requested as of now.

- Alani Apio-Contracted by Chick-fil-A to develop a plan for descendants and project proponents. A&B owns the land, Chick-fil-A is responsible for AIS. Chick-fil-A has been receptive to requests of descendants who support this plan. Kailua descendants have asked for least amount of ground disturbance as possible and it will be built up with fill. Parking lot is using spread footing for lights. This is mauka of pali lanes.
- Carlos Arias-Development manager for Chick-fil-A. 1 acre that encompasses 4 parcels. Proposing to demolish existing structures and then build up. Met with descendants about sensitivities around iwi kupuna with this site.
- Doug Hazelwood-Conducted a LRFI in the past. The site of the project hasn't been surveyed but surrounding area has been with burials found nearby. SHPD has required an AIS.

- Member Mills-With grading up, there would still be ground disturbance.
- Doug Hazelwood-The disturbance would range up to 6ft below grade with the building foundation to be 1-2ft below grade. All test trenches are planned to go to depth of excavation of construction. 40% coverage of area disturbed will be included in AIS. Areas with grease traps or pits will be fully excavated now. Limitations include that current structures on property that are still in business.
- Alani Apio-They've developed an outreach plan.
- Member Ako-Want to commend the approach.
- Chair Caceres-Recommend archaeological monitoring plan be done in a pre excavation style. Any soil that isn't fill is raked through by archaeologists.
- Susan Lebo-Can be done in an addendum AIS once the buildings are demoed.

- Doug Hazelwood-All recognized descendants are comfortable with preservation in place with HSR-1. 1 descendant that isn't recognized prefers relocation. Previously thought to be fragmentary remains but discovered it was an in situ burial. Only two descendants could attend consultation meeting we held but was able to get feedback from other descendants from emails calling for preservation in place with engineering controls. AIS being conducted concurrent to construction means decisions need to be made prior to acceptance of the AIS and preparation of the BTP. Water lines would be nearby the burial. A 5 sided metal shield over and around all iwi kupuna with vapor barrier over the shield. CLSM jacketing for all water lines in vicinity of HSR-1 and a permanent planter above HSR-1. After all consultation, 2 descendants prefer relocation either on-site or to Waikiki Memorial, one of those descendants is also willing to accept preservation in place. Primary concern is potential failure in pressurized water lines and if preserved in place only natural materials be used to preserve the iwi in place. Requesting guidance on these unresolved issues in consultation.
- Chair Caceres-Typically determination on disposition is done at the conclusion of the AIS.
- Member Erhorn-Prefer preservation in place.
- Mana Caceres-Encountered this when I was on council years ago and had to make sure the interim protection measures were identical to what will be in the BTP.
- Chair Caceres-That only applies under the premise of determining the burial will be preserved in place.
- Susan Lebo-You can't make a determination at this point, can only make a recommendation. If there are no iwi kupuna findings, they would finish out the AIS. If there are findings, they have to follow the full AIS report and once accepted they can submit the BTP for acceptance. They have to preserve in place allowing for burial council when the BTP comes forward to make the final decision. Interim

- protection measures. Protection measures are typically determined between SHPD, descendants, and project proponents.
- Member Ako-Whatever is proposed in the interim should not impede the long term plan. Recall from the meeting that if the iwi are relocated there could be further harm.
  - Chair Caceres-Becasue there isn't imminent harm to the burials, we shouldn't consider relocation. Prefer steel over concrete because steel stops construction operators
  - Member Mills-Want to respect the recognized descendant's wishes. If there is a catastrophic failure, will the metal protect the iwi? Recommend concrete.
  - Member Erhorn-Steel won't be there in 150 years, concrete will.
  - Member Ako-If one of the descendants you consulted with isn't recognized, why is their mana'o given weight. Recommend there not be permanancy with the protection measures
  - Chair Caceres-We recommended a couple months ago that cultural stakeholders be included but we can't consider his request for relocation at this point. Recommend 5 sided concrete vault and other proposals.

*Member Mills leaves. Quorum is lost.*

All 22 locations are completed, 2 locations had iwi kupuna. Hoping to use Ililani as a reinterment site for one of the burials. Trench F will be preserved in place. Vertical and horizontal steel plates will be used as protection measures. Property is owned by HART with DTS adjacent. Trench G proposed relocation to Ililani reinterment site. A small concrete vault would be installed next to the existing one, but need confirmation from Ililani assocaiation of unit owners. If they say no, the backup in the BTP will be relocation to Trench F. Inadvertent discoveries have been reburied in February 25, 2026. Have determination for PIP for two burials. SIHP 10160 proposing a 2x4 steel plate over top of the vault. Need concurrence of Honolulu Community College. SIHP 10295 proposing a 2x4 area would be sufficient. Cultural descendants were generally in acceptance of proposed treatments and will seek additional comments from them.

**H. Discussion Regarding the Student Housing Project on Kalākaua Avenue, Waikīkī Ahupua'a, Kona District, O'ahu, TMKs: (1) 2-6-015:023 and 045.**

- Matt McDermott-Area will have less than 2ft of ground disturbance for the most part. A lot of soil remediation has been done. Water table is at 5-7ft with fill about 4ft below. Project is a 9 story, 33 unit student housing residence. Ground disturbance includes demo of existing structure, grading, and excavations of new building foundation, utilities, elevaotr, and landscape/hardscape. Awarded during mahele to Lunalilo. Appears to historically be in a marshy area outside of ag lands and fishponds. Past archaeological reports show historic structures and a burial nearby. Proposed AIS testing strategy is focused on deepest ground disturbance with 1% testing of project area. Will continue to consult with descendants, submit AIS strategy to SHPD, complete fieldwork and report and update OIBC with results.

**I. Discussion Regarding Kailua Burial Map Development, Kailua Ahupua‘a, Ko‘olaupoko District, Island of O‘ahu, Various TMKs.**

- Nick Belluzzo-Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs wanted to have all projects involving jaucus sands go to SHPD for review. A permitted interaction group was formed and recommended that SHPD establish a boundary for the Kailua community burial ground assign SIHP, and determine if eligible for register of historic places. Also SHPD and DPP to work together to figure out how this would work. Could serve as a model for protections of burial grounds on other parts of the island. Missing Bishop Museum data, precise locational data in some instances, and burial site files stored at SHPD. 366 iwi kupuna identified of which Bishop museum accessioned 145 iwi kupuna between 1926 and 1982. Geodatabase was built with higher density based on the distance from and number of burials nearby and is designed to be iterative. Missing instances of non-reporting, unmonitored, missing files, and pre-historic preservation law finds. Bias based on nature and timing of ground disturbance, e.g., post-and-pier construction in the 1950s vs. recent mass grading. Hoping once there is a boundary that is agreed upon, something will happen but what? Would like to come back next month.
- Susan Lebo-We’re continuing to find records related to burial finds in this area.

Late written testimony will be retained as part of the administrative record and distributed to OIBC members accordingly, but we cannot ensure the OIBC will receive it in sufficient time to review, prior to decision-making.**

**To provide in-person oral testimony:**

**Attend the meeting in person: address, date, and time are on the meeting notice and at the top of the agenda.**

**We kindly ask that all oral testimony be limited to not more than three (3) minutes. We ask that you identify yourself and any affiliation before speaking, but you can choose not to do so.**

**Pursuant to HRS § 92-3, all interested persons shall be afforded the opportunity to present oral testimony or submit data, views, or arguments, in writing, on any agenda item. Public testimony for items listed on the agenda is strongly recommended to be limited to three minutes per agenda item. We ask that you identify yourself and any affiliation before speaking, but you can choose not to do so.**

**Pursuant to HRS § 6E-43.5(e), the council may hold a closed meeting if the location and description of a burial site is under consideration.**

**The OIBC may go into Executive Session pursuant to HRS § 92-5(a)(4) to consult with its attorney on questions and issues pertaining to the Council's powers, duties, privileges, immunities, and liabilities.**

**It is strongly recommended that any member of the public who requests for an item to be placed on a burial council meeting agenda must make this request with the Burial Sites Program staff at least two weeks preceding the scheduled meeting date. This request shall be accompanied by all related documents. Failure to comply with this procedure may delay the item to the following month's agenda.**

On behalf of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), the State of Hawaii Department of Transportation (HDOT) is notifying you that on January 16, 2026, Section 106 of the NHPA of 1966 (amended, 2006), was initiated with the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) for the subject Interstate Route H-201, Seismic Retrofit of Puuloa Interchange project.

The proposed federally funded HDOT project is considered a federal action and undertaking as defined in Title 36, Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Section 800.16(y). Effective May 1, 2016, FHWA issued a Delegation of Authority allowing HDOT and local public agencies to conduct NHPA Section 106 consultations with the SHPO, NHOs, and qualified consulting parties per Title 36, CFR, Section 800.2(c)(4). The FHWA will remain responsible for all findings and determinations charged to the agency during the Section 106 process.

### **Overview of the Undertaking**

The HDOT plans to complete seismic retrofits to the Puuloa Interchange, above Interstate Route H-201 at the approximate coordinates of 157°53'47"W 21°20'56"N. The proposed undertaking consists of retrofitting the ramps and pedestrian overpass, which were built in the 1970s, to meet current American Association of State Highway Transportation Officials' seismic design standards.

This could include installing:

- Creep blocks;
- Seat extenders with and without longitudinal restraints;
- Pier cap retrofits; and
- Foundation retrofits.

The total combined area of the Area of Potential Effects (APE) is approximately 26.9 acres. The APE encompasses the Mahiole Street and Jarrett White Road intersection and ends at the beginning of the on-ramp from Puuloa Road to Moanalua Freeway westbound. The APE consists of the TMK Nos. HDOT ROW, three state owned parcels (1-1-007:045; 1-1-009:006; and 1-1-009:007) and one privately owned parcel (1-1-007:038). Most ramps and structures being retrofitted are considered HDOT ROW; however, some work will need to be done to the foundations of these ramps which extend into the State-owned parcels below. The private parcel contains a Home Depot; however, no construction will occur within this parcel. A construction easement is needed to access ramp foundations located within parcel 1-1-007:045. Staging will occur on roadway shoulders and in the areas located below the ramps. Subsurface work may extend to the footings of the ramps.

In a letter dated February 13, 2026, the State Historic Preservation Division identified that the Spring of Iemi (State Inventory of Historic Places Site No. 50-80-14-02304) is located in the APE at the intersection of Jarrett White Road and Mahiole Street as shown in attached APE Map. The Spring was favored among chiefs and konohiki. No evidence of Iemi Spring was identified within the APE during a field inspection completed for an Archaeological Literature Review and Field Inspection Report for the project, and the area is heavily disturbed due to roadway construction. Therefore, no impacts are anticipated to the historic site; however, Section 106 consultation is still ongoing and FHWA will make a determination of effects pursuant to Section 106 at a later date.

### **Consultations**

Entitled consulting parties during the Section 106 process include the Advisory Council of Historic Preservation; SHPO; NHOs; and if applicable, local governments and applicants for federal assistance, permits, licenses, and other approvals.

NHOs and/or Hawaiian Descendants

NHOs and Native Hawaiian descendants with ancestral, lineal or cultural ties to, cultural and historical property knowledge of and/or concerns for, and cultural or religious attachments to the proposed APE are asked to provide a response to this letter within 30 days of notification.

Other Individuals and Organizations

Individuals and organizations with legal, economic, or historic preservation interest are requested to respond within 30 days of notification, demonstrate interest in the proposed undertaking, and provide intent to participate in the Section 106 process. Your participation is subject to FHWA approval.

**Identification of Historic Properties within the APE**

We welcome any information you may have on historical and cultural sites that have been recorded in or which you may have knowledge of within the proposed APE. In addition, if you are acquainted with any persons or organizations that are knowledgeable about the proposed APE, or any descendants with ancestral, lineal, or cultural ties to, or cultural knowledge and/or historical properties information of, or concerns for, and cultural or religious attachments to the proposed APE, we would appreciate receiving their names and contact information within 30 days of this notice.

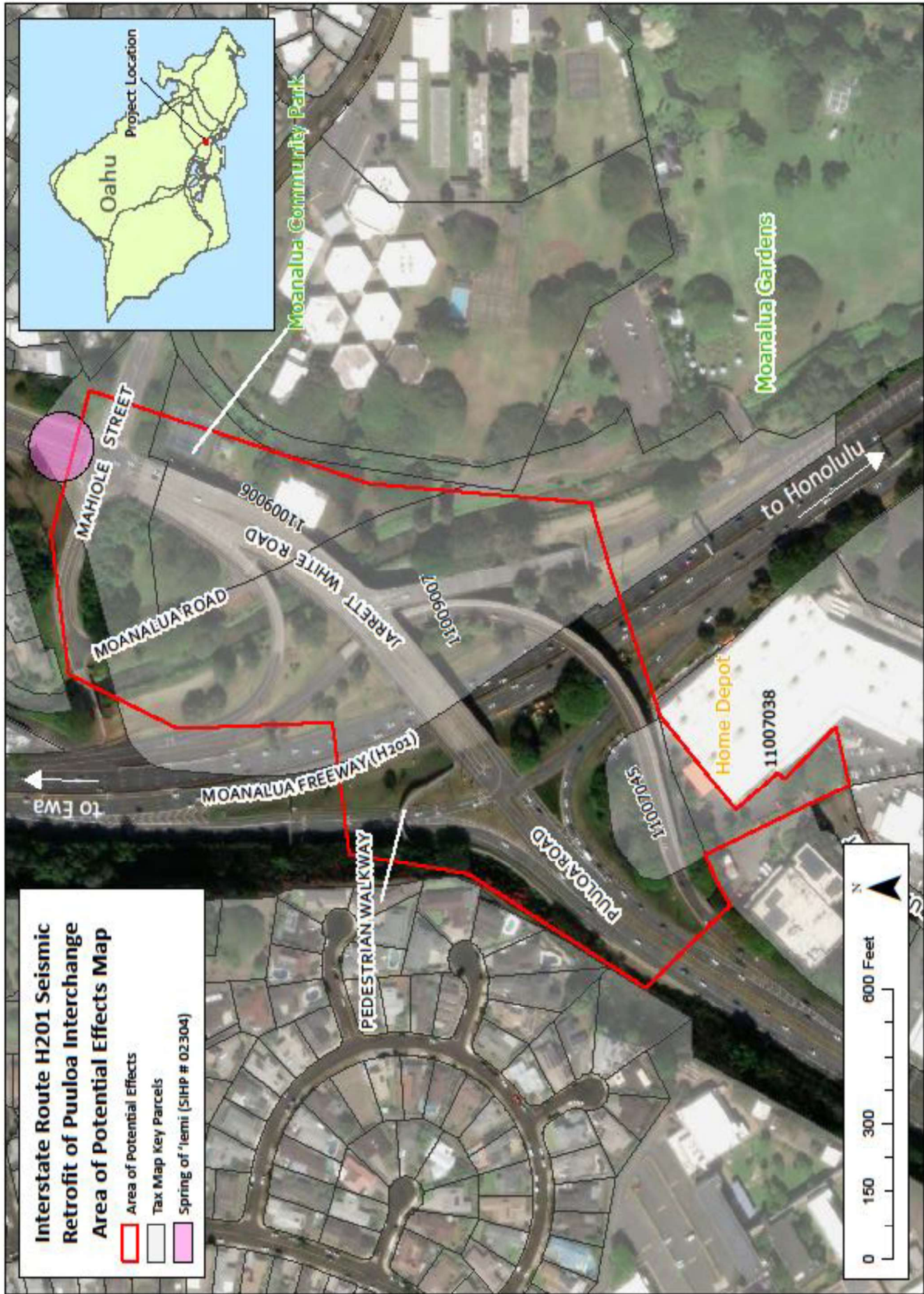
**Conclusion**

**PROJECT DESCRIPTION:**

The Honolulu Board of Water Supply (BWS) proposes demolition and replacement of security fencing at Makakilo 920 Reservoir in Makakilo, O'ahu, Hawai'i. The proposed project will utilize Board of Water Supply land, and is subject to review pursuant to Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS) §6E. The proposed project will also utilize federal funding that is administered by the State of Hawai'i, Department of Health (DOH), through the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) program, and will be considered a federal action and undertaking as defined by Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) of 1966, as amended.

The proposed work includes demolition of 1,183 linear feet (LF) of existing 8-foot-tall chain-link fence and existing 8-foot-tall expanded metal mesh fence, along with associated barbed wire, fence posts, and concrete footings. 1,181 LF of new 8-foot-tall expanded metal mesh fence will be installed to replace the existing fence along the same general alignment. Installation of the new fence will involve installation of new fence posts and footings. Concrete footings will be installed to a depth of up to 6 feet 6 inches below ground surface, and will have a diameter of 2 feet. Footings and posts will be set at a maximum spacing of 9 feet on-center. The new fence will be topped with three-strand barbed wire. Existing slope erosion along the West side of the property will be addressed with new erosion control matting.

**PROPOSED AREA OF POTENTIAL EFFECT:** Approximately 1.88 acres

**AFFECTED TMK:** (1) 9-2-019:026

**POTENTIAL HISTORIC RESOURCES:**

An Archaeological Literature Review and Field Inspection (LRFI) report for the BWS Security Fencing at Makakilo 920 Reservoir Project, Honouliuli Ahupua'a, 'Ewa District, O'ahu, TMKs: [1] 9-2-019:026 (Shideler and Hammatt 2024) was prepared for the proposed project.

Security Fencing at Makakilo 920 Reservoir

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The LRFI identifies numerous previous archaeological studies within approximately 1.8 kilometers of the project site, but none within the APE. The closest historic properties identified by these archaeological studies are located 750 meters to the south and 800 meters to the east. The historic property to the south includes State Inventory of Historic Places (SIHP) # 50-80-12-07664, consisting of two basalt boulders with petroglyphs. The historic property to the east is a military bunker on Pu'umakakilo (no formal site # assigned). The LRFI indicated the chance of any undiscovered surface or subsurface historic properties were low due to the previous grading across the entire area. Therefore, the report recommends a determination of "no historic properties affected".

The Makakilo 920 Reservoir facility was likely constructed in or around 1975. The facility is likely 50 years old and is a historic property, as defined in HRS §6E-2.

No other historic properties were identified on or near the APE. It is unlikely any undiscovered historic properties will be present due to extensive prior grubbing and grading of the entire site.

Pursuant to HRS §6E-8 and Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) and implementing regulations at 36 CFR part 800, we are consulting with you/your organization to identify potential impacts that the subject project may have on sites or practices of historic, cultural, or religious significance. 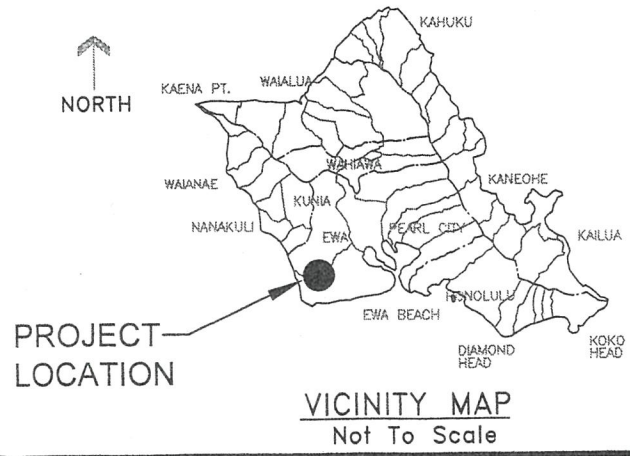
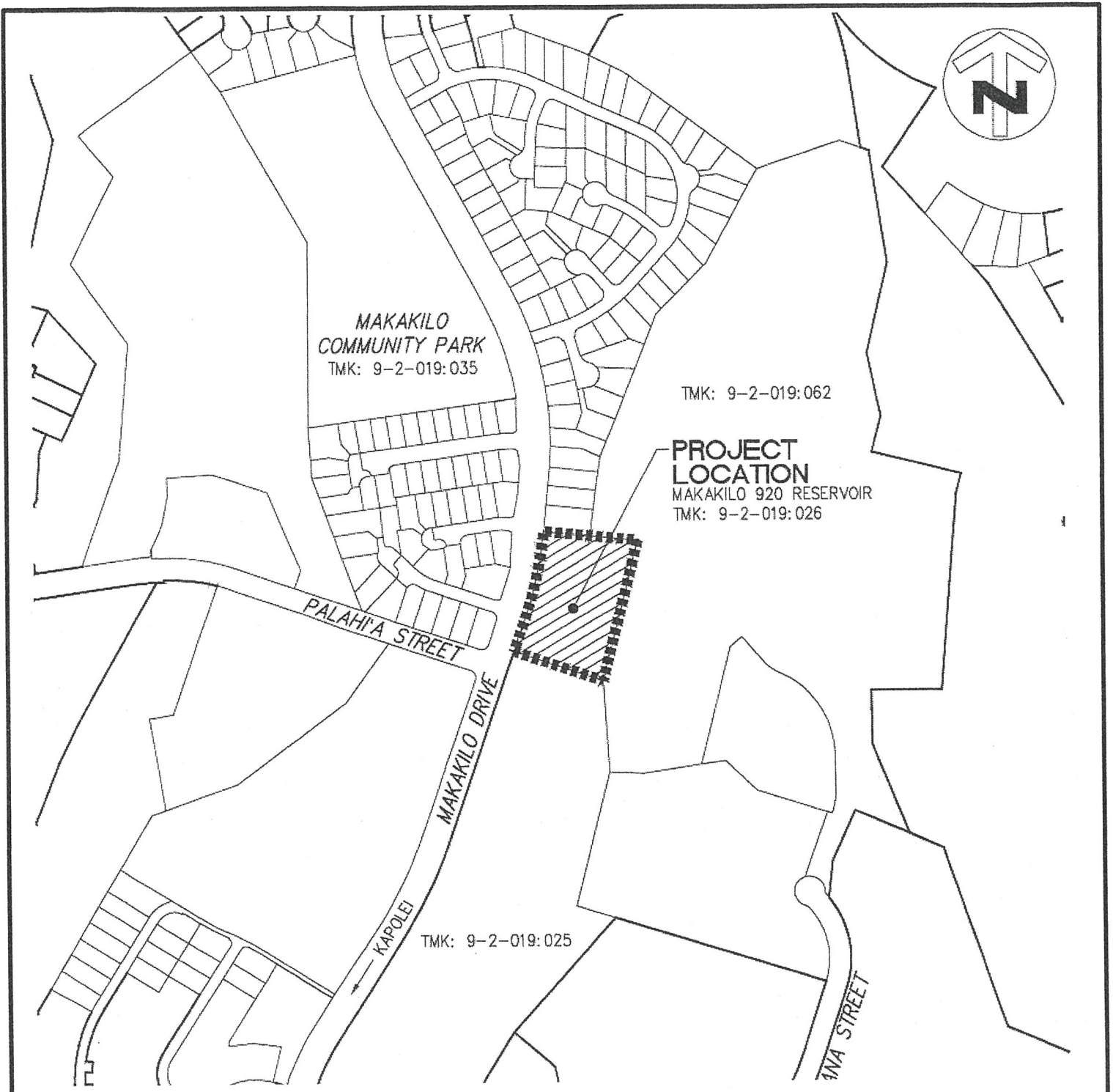
