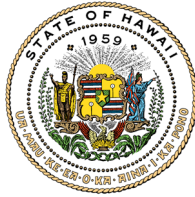

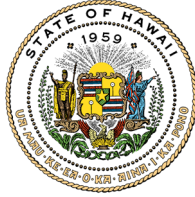

Doug Hazelwood-This project has been stalled since December. Last week the owner agreed to move the process forward. Hoping will be resolved in next month or two. It was delayed because owners were upset things didn't move quickly but have been working with them to begin to move forward again. Burials were disinterred and the homeowners prepared a crypt to receive the remains. They believed SHPD would coordinate and handle reburial efforts. Expect SIHP request to be sent to SHPD before next meeting. Will work with Traven to make sure all descendants are notified. Iwi haven't been wrapped yet and can be.

Member Ako-What behaviors are being exhibited that lead to the conclusion they're not being cooperative.

Doug Hazelwood-We spent several weeks collecting the remains. They were upset that it was taking so long and they refused to pay us for all the work up to that point and threatened to sue us and the state. No AIS was done on the property, the design was altered to minimize ground disturbance.

Chair Caceres-If future conflicts arise, feel free to reach out to us.

Mana Caceres-We would like to be included in the consultation.

Susan Lebo-SHPD archaeology will work with you on the SIHP request.

Nick Belluzzo-During monitored and unmonitored work for trenching for a wall iwi were found. They initially started without monitoring and then we began afterwards. Had to screen all the backdirt. Grave pits and graves sites outside of the trench seem to have been impacted, 7 burial pits largely intact and a total of 9 individuals represented. Just finished and haven't had a chance to debrief with HDOT and Traven to figure out what designs are possible for preservation in place. Hoping to have a meeting to work through that by next council meeting.

Traven Apiki-This is a fencing project for a school, there were 3 fragments of different individuals found during the excavation of the fence post holes. LOD for preservation in place was issued for all of them. While they were digging a hole a new fence post hole they found articulated foot bones in the sidewall. They intended to reinter the iwi from the sites into that hole. During excavation of some of the holes that were excavated with a vac truck iwi were found but it was unclear which of the holes they originated from. They worked to reinter the iwi and they came across this additional individual. It seemed as though it could be a whole individual and so we met to discuss redesign of the fencing.

Mana Caceres-Not speaking on behalf of the project but as a descendant. The iwi kupuna found along kuhio was buried where it was originated from.

Doug Hazelwood-Passman residence. In situ burial discovered during a project at the edge of the development line. Determination made with homeowners to preserve in place. The remains were scattered and we had to recover fragmentary remains that were scattered over a week. All recovered remains were reinterred with the insitu burial. Steel plates were placed around the burial to prevent disturbance from construction. The BSC is being prepared. After construction restarted, a trench face collapsed that revealed additional fragments that seem to be from the in situ burial. This project had remains that were stolen in the beginning of the project. Evidence suggested it was homeless that frequented the area and we were unable to relocate them which is why we are temporarily curating iwi at our headquarters and not onsite. We'll be shoring up the trench walls to ensure the walls don't collapse.

Chair Caceres-If the iwi aren't wrapped yet would recommend wrapping them as soon as possible.

Traven Apiki-May 1 CSH reported an inadvertent discovery from excavation of a catch basin. It was found to be 2 individuals based on the skeletal element, fragments from an adult and a child both who seem to have been previously disturbed. On May 5, an adult femur shaft was also found. May 13, a femur shaft fragment was also found that seems to be associated with the find from May 5. The MNI is 3 individuals, all iwi were secured in place and a 20ft buffer was created. Chair Caceres-Did a site visit and it was explained the catch basin is required because of the potential of runoff to the ocean but the catch basin will be filled in later. See two options, both require relocation now until the catch basin is completed and then the kupuna can be reinterred in its find location or relocation to the burial preserve. If relocating now and still have to wait to be put in the burial preserve, would rather have them go back to their original location.

Susan Lebo-The AIS report has been submitted but not accepted. Traditional approach has been that building permit wouldn't be given until the AIS has been completed. Unsure if the permit was given.

Chair Caceres-I received a call from Traven about the flooding that happened and iwi kupuna were pedestaled in the trench, it flooded, and the iwi kupuna was lost. The structure was falling into the trench so they filled it with concrete. The concrete poured was exactly what they needed for the structure.

Traven Apiki-The archaeologist working on it was supposed to come before the council, not sure why he hasn't come before the council.

Chair Caceres-I have a number of concerns. The typical processes with an AIS seem to have been bypassed due to weather.

Susan Lebo-SHPD is currently working with SCS for assignment of SIHP numbers for resources and iwi kupuna. Once done can move forward with completing a review for the AIS and then the next step would be the BTP. The concern is reaching an agreement on where the iwi were identified and the context as well as a series of pit features and other resources. Want to agree on the resources present. There are 4 pit features all coming from the same deposit. What was supposed to be the original excavation area is now twice the size and we want to see the documentation of when the scope was changed.

Member Erhorn-How feasible is it to dig a parallel trench adjacent to what was filled with concrete?

Susan Lebo-There's enough information from photos and documents to have the discussion.

Member Ako-Was the concrete poured requiring any permitting that got circumvented?

Susan Lebo-That's a DPP issue.

Chair Caceres-Will follow up with Michael Kat with DPP.

At the end of that time and site visit, something should've been done to mark them. The Fukumitsu ohana received lineal recognition to these burials. Regina helped facilitate the coordination of this. We couldn't continue to come to these meetings for the six years leading up to this. I'm here today and would like to thank Traven, Josh, and Sam to make this happen. Mahalo Regina for all she did but in this case the ball got dropped. The family wants to be here but they are busy.

Chair Caceres-The purpose of this site visit is so the family can point out the exact location of the burials and SHPD can take the GPS data.

Sam Hemenway-The site visit 6 years ago was to look at the septic tank in relation to the burials. The burials were pointed out but we are trying to go back and see if any data was taken during that time.

Traven Apiki-The purpose of having the family present to point out the exact location of the burials. At this point it's a matter of agreeing on a date and time to go out with the family and take GPS data of the exact place of the burials.

Kamuella Kalai-My understanding is that was not the purpose of the site visit. The registration was already submitted.

E. Discussion Regarding an Update on the O'ahu Island Burial Council Recommendation to Recognize Kananelu Beach Park as a Registered Burial Site, Located in Ka'a'awa Ahupua'a, Ko'olauloa District, Island of O'ahu, TMK: (1) 5-1-013:011.

Chair Caceres-The more iwi kupuna previously recognized, the more power we have in terms of preservation in place. Recently, if these iwi kupuna are found to be previously identified, they would have to wait to once a month to be addressed at OIBC. If SHPD is working the way it should, they can respond quicker.

Kamuella Kalai-SHPD hasn't been there to recover any iwi kupuna, its community members. My fear is the iwi kupuna impacted will be stored somewhere on SHPD shelves. There are people that can collect and curate so they're not sitting on shelves.

Chair Caceres-The solution Traven was proposing was having descendants do exactly that. Is it a reasonable timeline to have that draft available by next month?

Kamuella Kalai-The problem is that its not recognized descendants that are down there, its community members who notify SHPD.

Traven Apiki-Only recognized descendants can temporarily curate iwi kupuna legally. There's no issues with community members monitoring though.

Vice-Chair Shafer-A lot of times recognized descendants are busy and there are others in the area that make it their kuleana. Ian goes almost daily because he feels like that's part of his kuleana. Somehow we need someone with kuleana that will take care of them.

Mana Caceres-One of the major points for this is working with OIBC to identify recognized descendants to figure out who should be caretakers of the iwi.

Michelle Clark-Introduced project in January 2026, here to present AIS testing strategy. 0.92 acres, proposed project is mixed use residential condominium. 315 units. Private project with no federal involvement. In May architectural study was accepted by SHPD and agreed AIS is needed, they requested consultation with descendants and stakeholders. Property is historically used as wetland ag and fishponds. Testing strategy involves 12 test excavations measuring 20ft by 2.5 ft. 1.5% coverage of the project area. Trenches placed to provide coverage of historic properties (fishponds and berms). Responses during consultation include a request for additional testing ranging to 100% AIS, request for stronger focus on proposed extensive project excavations, and concerns noting the gap in the testing strategy due to the existing structure. To address concerns, areas where preservation in place can be prioritized, including potential redesign, minimizing impacts during construction with neat cut elements where possible, identifying locations for potential reburial sites should it be necessary. Next steps include refining AIS testing strategy to address consultation, complete AIS fieldwork and reports, and updating consulting parties with results. Final testing strategy hasn't been determined but additional trenches are being added so overall coverage of the project area will increase.

Chair Caceres-Recommend testing the entirety of the grease trap.

Member Ako-Concerned that minimal amount of testing increases potential of inadvertent finds in the future. We should know as much as possible what is present.

Michelle Clark-Trenches go as deep as the water table or as appropriate, in this case about 6 feet.

Chair Caceres-Would be in favor of an addendum AIS if necessary when there is more space available to reduce indoor testing.

Mike-Is it possible after building is removed a trench is done then?

Susan Lebo-We've worked with DPP for project proponents to split their applications for demo and building. Can do the demo and then test everything deemed appropriate before the building.

D. Discussion Regarding Archaeological Inventory Survey and DRAFT Burial Treatment Plan for Native Hawaiian Skeletal Remains – Iwi Kūpuna – at the Waikīkī Aquarium, Waikīkī Ahupua'a, Kona District, Island of O'ahu, TMK: (1) 3-1-031:06.

Doug Hazelwood-Here to discuss expanding scope of project. AIS is occurring concurrent with construction. Iwi kupuna have been identified at 5 locations and all are being preserved in place. Proposed changes to project include replacement of edge of reef exhibit and UH would like to expand the ongoing AIS to include this. Proposed changes would delay completion of the AIS and BTP for about 1 year. It would eliminate the potential for having to revise the BTP should any additional iwi kupuna be discovered during the EOR AIS work. Descendants would be asked to consult on the expanded AIS work plans but haven't received any feedback as of yet. Guidance requested is combine the ongoing wastewater project with upcoming EOR project or keep the two projects separate.

Chair Caceres-If long term protections measures can be implemented now, it would be ideal.

Susan Lebo-The measures implemented would be interim measures but could be written into the BTP to be the long term measures as well.

Doug Hazelwood-There is still discussion among descendants about HSR1 and nearby pipes and we can't do that until the BTP is approved.

Mana Caceres-We've had it in the past where the interim measures were turned into permanent measures and it can be as simple as having an eye bolt in the lid of the vault so it can be removed if needed.

Member Ako-Is it possible to get an overview of the whole project?

Member Ehrhorn-I concur, I'd like to see a master plan of the whole project.

Jason Yee-The intake system is part of the footprint of an existing structure. We had a masterplan at one point but not sure what the current plan is for the other areas.

Proposed Action

The LSM-class ship is a specialized vessel designed to transport troops, vehicles, and equipment directly to shore. We hope this letter finds you well. We are writing to inform you that the Allen County Museum and Historical Society (ACM) cares for Native American items removed from locations across the country including Hawaii and unknown geographic locations. We sincerely apologize for the decades-long delay in contacting you about these items. We look forward to working with you to identify and repatriate any unassociated funerary objects, objects of cultural patrimony, and sacred objects that are culturally affiliated with your Tribe. We also look forward to consulting with you about traditional care pursuant to 43 CFR 10.1(d) Duty of Care. ACM is committed to respectful repatriation and hope our actions, beginning with this letter, will demonstrate this commitment.

Native American Collection

ACM stewards approximately 1,500 Native American items from all regions of the country and items removed from unknown geographic locations. One item was documented as being removed from "the Sandwich Island". The items removed from unknown geographic locations include baskets, stone tools, points, pottery, and beaded clothing. These items were donated to ACM by multiple donors between 1908-1980. The most notable donors being James Pillar, Merle Harrod, Judge Theodore Robb, J.C. McCullough, and James MacDonnell. A complete list of known donors is enclosed with this letter.

For your review, enclosed, you will find two reports:

- Report of the Item Removed from Hawaii
- List of Known Donors

Duty of Care

We are also committed to seeking and following Tribal guidance concerning the care and use of Native American cultural items in our possession, control, or custody consistent with NAGPRA's Duty of Care Regulation [43 CFR 10.1(d)]. If you have written guidance already prepared, we would be grateful to receive it.

Known Hazards

ACM has no knowledge or record of the presence of any potentially hazardous substances used to treat any items.

Invitation to Consult

We welcome the opportunity to engage with you in meaningful consultation with your Tribe. We also understand that you are likely busy with similar requests and greatly appreciate your time and efforts. A consultation would allow us to establish a relationship and review what is known about the items to help you determine if any should be repatriated. Consultation would also provide an opportunity for you to share guidance on culturally appropriate care and use of cultural items in ACM's possession, control, or custody.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The Honolulu Board of Water Supply is proposing the repair and replacement of an aging 8-inch water main in the 'Aiea area. The project area extends approximately 500 linear feet along Moanalua Road, although the portion of the main to be repaired is approximately 20 linear feet. The purpose of the project is to improve water system reliability. This work will require the use of heavy construction equipment to create an open trench averaging 2 feet wide and 6 feet deep. All construction work will be within existing road right-of-ways. (See below map for locations.)

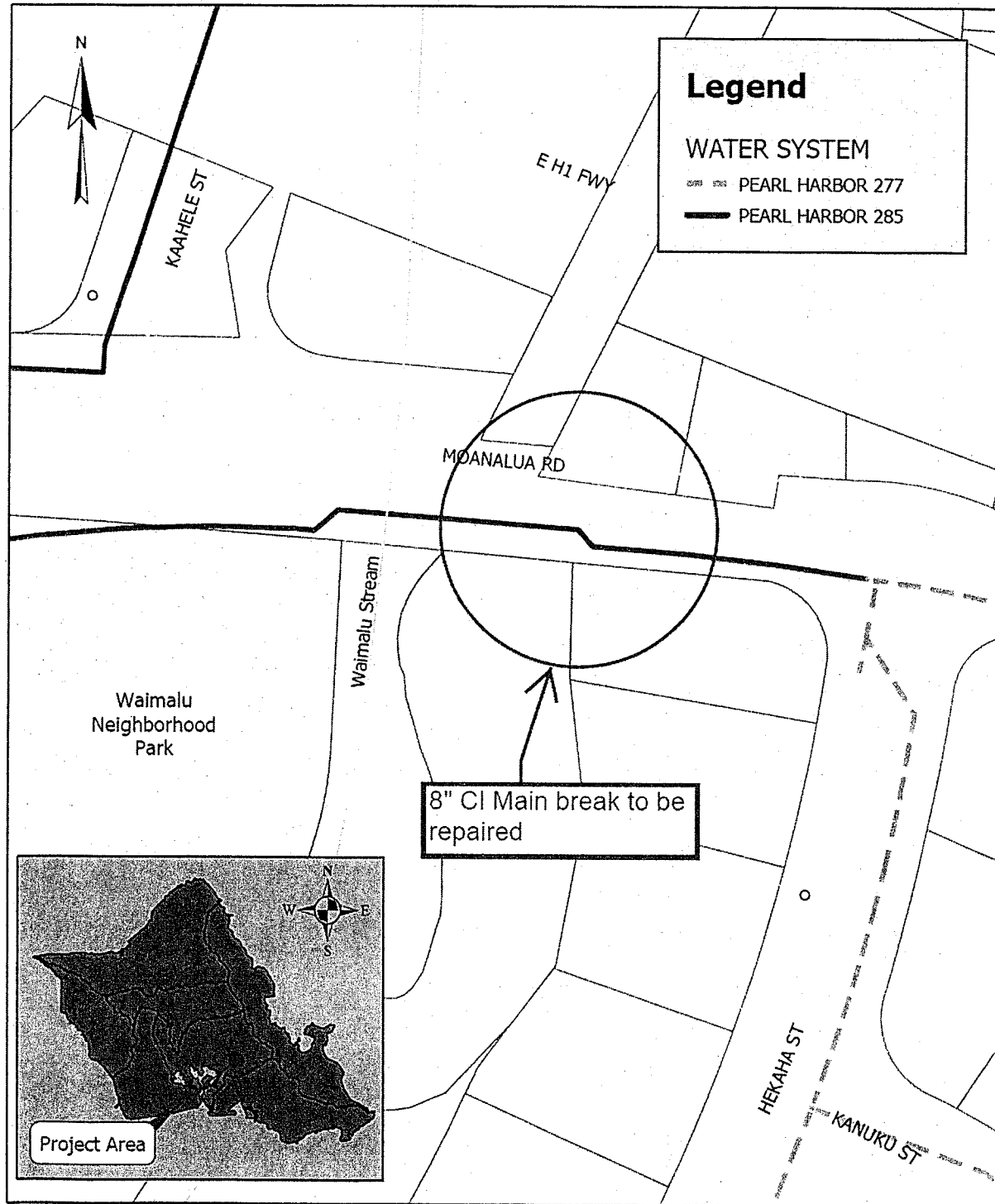
