Summary Paragraph

The Ronald Kamehameha o ka hae Hawaii von Holt residence is a 2.7-acre oceanfront property on the West coast of the Big Island. The property consists of mostly lava rock and some beach rock along the shore. There are three connected fish ponds on the property. The property was purchased in 1936 and most of the improvements were completed by 1938. The residence has been in continuous use as a family beach cottage. It has been in the same family since 1936 and has maintained its historic integrity. It was designed by architects Albert Ely Ives and George Hogan. There are seven contributing buildings: the main house, the sleeping house, two water storage tanks, a lauhala hale, and two outhouses. The noncontributing building is a storage building recently built to look like the original buildings.

Narrative Description

The property at Weli Weli bay is located on the West coast of the Big Island. It is within the ahupua'a of Pu'uanahulu and in the moku of Kona.¹

The oceanfront property is 2.7 acres and is surrounded by lava flows on three sides. A 5' high dry stack rock wall, over 1000' long marks the surveyed property lines to the north, south, and east. A 385' concrete wall to the west is a surveyed property line that protects the property from the ocean. All the walls were built at the time of the property development in 1938.

The property consists of seven contributing buildings and three fishponds. A non-contributing storage building is located just east of the sleeping house and two outhouse bathrooms sit on the other side of the lava hill on the far east side of the property.

There are three interconnected Anchialine² fish ponds. They provide a softness to the visual harshness of the surrounding lava. The numerous surrounding coconut trees were planted when the property was being developed. The ponds were restored with the intention of raising Anae, or mullet. The north pond is on the nw corner of the property, closest to the ocean. There is a small island on the west side of the pond. There is a small pond and waterway that connects the north pond with the center pond. The center pond is on the east side of the main house. There is a small deck on the west side of the center pond. The south end of the center pond connects to the south pond which is on the south end of the property. While all the ponds are brackish, the south pond has more fresh water springs keeping the water less salty. The three ponds span from the north property line to the south property line. Ronald built Mākāhās (Sluice gates) between the ponds to control fish movement.

The property has a tropical ambiance with many coconut trees and native Hawaiian plants.

The main house, the sleeping house, and the two water storage tanks are original rock buildings. Each is constructed with solid interior and exterior walls of lava rock and coral. The exterior walls are banded with three feet of black lava rock, topped by three feet of coral, then capped with another three foot band of black lava rock. The interior walls are black lava rock. They all have concrete slab foundations/flooring. The main house and sleeping house have low pitched hip roofs with gray asphalt roofing material and the water storage buildings have flat wood framed roofs covered with gray asphalt roofing material. No original plans are available.

Main House

The main house is 24' x 54' (1296 sq/ft) with a three-foot roof overhang and a 3' concrete walkway that is on all sides of the house. Openings on all four sides allow for natural cooling with the ocean breezes. The west or ocean side has 28' sliding wooden and glass doors spanning 9' floor to ceiling. The east or pond side has four 7' wide and 9' tall hinged screen and metal grated doors spanning 28' that reach floor to ceiling. The north and south sides have 16' of sliding wood-framed windows that are 5' tall. The interior has no interior walls and the fixtures and furnishing are all original. On the north end are large, oversize beds for sleeping. The wooden frames and cabinets around the beds are original. The long dining table Ronald made from coconut trees from the property is center in the house welcoming many to sit and enjoy. At the south end is the kitchen with its original wooden cabinetry. The ceilings and exterior roof overhangs are white canec³ panels.

The kitchen windows on the south side overlook the large 30' by 30' concrete lanai decorated with smaller coral and lava rock patterns. The lanai is beautifully shaded by trained Hau trees that are supported by white metal pipes. Some of these pipes are used to divert rain water from the roof of the main house to the fresh water tank that is on the southeast corner of the lanai.

Sleeping House

The sleeping house building is 14" by 36' (504sq/ft) with a three-foot roof overhang. It has the same rock and coral banded walls and concrete foundation and flooring. It is divided into three rooms with 1x 12 redwood interior walls. There are no doorways/halls between the rooms. The ceilings and overhangs are white canec. There are two

built-in wood bunk beds in the south room, one bunkbed in the middle room, and a wooden platform for a king size bed in the north room. Some of the woodwork in the sleeping house has been replaced due to damage but was re-built to look like the original. Each of the three rooms has a hinged louvered entry door that opens to the exterior on the east side and six-foot sliding wood windows on the west. There are six-foot sliding wood windows on the north and south ends of the building as well.

Water Storage Tank Buildings

The two water storage tank buildings are 10' by 10' and were designed to hold water for domestic use. The lower tank has the lava and coral banding, sits on a concrete foundation, and has a wood framed and asphalt roofing material. The flat roofs have access panels to check water levels. There is an oversized clam shell sink and a water faucet on the north side of the lower tank. The upper tank, located on a hill overlooking the south pond, stores brackish water which is pumped from the ponds below. It is then gravity fed to the house and the hale for non-potable use. The rock work on the upper tank is mostly black lava and not as precise as the other rock work on the property. The upper tank also sits on a concrete foundation and has the same wood and asphalt flat roof. The lower water storage tank located on the se corner of the concrete patio stores fresh water which is catchment from the rain off of the roof of the main house. Currently, with the addition of solar electricity, this water is pumped into the main house for non-potable use. Drinking water is brought in.

Lauhala Hale

Two lauhala hales were built in 1938. There was one at the north pond and one at the south pond. The hales provided personal space to shower and change clothes. The north hale degraded to the point that it was removed. The south hale stands today. It is a 10' by 10' wooden frame structure with lauhala roofing and siding. There is a 24" window opening on the west side and a 36" window opening on the north side. The door opening is on the east side overlooking the south pond. It has been re-thatched a couple times using the same method that was used in the original 1938 building. The original hales were thatched by Jack Paolu from Pu'uanahulu. He taught the method to George Kaono a caretaker and friend. Kenneth Emory of the Bishop Museum watched and recorded the thatching process as they were interested in the process of building hales from lauhala. The lauhala was bundled and hauled in from an off-site property. There is not enough on site. It is soaked in the pond for four or five days until it is pliable. The leaves are laid over wooden dowels and lashed to the dowel by Spectra. 4 It is then lashed to the row below it.

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance, applicable criteria, justification for the period of significance, and any applicable criteria considerations.)

The Ronald Kamehameha o ka hae Hawaii von Holt residence has historical significance under Criterion B and C. It is an excellent example of a 1930's Kona Coast beach cottage designed by prominent Hawaii architects, Albert Ely Ives and George Hogan. The period of significance is 1938; the construction date.

Significance under Criterion B is for the life of Ronald Kamehameha o ka hae Hawaii von Holt (1898-1953), a prominent cattle rancher and the builder of Weli Weli. Period of significance is his life span 1898 to 1953. Ronald's ancestors are also historically prominent figures in Hawaii's history.

Criterion B

Alexander Ronald Kamehameha o ka hae Hawaii von Holt was born in Honolulu on August 11, 1898, the day before the American flag was raised over the islands. His middle name (o ka hae Hawaii) is historically significant as it translates to "the last child born under the Hawaiian flag 5 ".

Ronald was one of five children of Ida Elizabeth Knudsen and Heinrich "Harry" von Holt. Ida Knudsen is a direct descendent of the Captain Francis Sinclair family. The Sinclairs originally emigrated to New Zealand from Scotland in 1839. They settled on the South Island in Pidgeon Bay. Upon the death of Captain Sinclair in 1846, the remaining Sinclair family headed for a new place to live. After several failures, they decided to return to Oahu where they had stopped in their journey to and from New Zealand. They eventually ended up in Honolulu where King Kamehameha offered to sell them the Island of Ni'ihau for \$10,000.00. The island had a population of 300 Hawaiians, whom the family agreed to care for. The island remains in the ownership of the Robinson/Sinclair family.

Heinrich "Harry" von Holt is a direct descendant of Hermann von Holt who came to Honolulu from Hamburg Germany in 1858. He started a mercantile business called "von Holt and Heuck" in 1861. He married Alice "Lilly" Brown and had four children, one of them Harry, Ronald's father.

Ronald was a prominent cattle rancher running the Kahua Ranch in Waimea from 1928 until his death in 1953. Kahua, which translates to "the beginning, the source, or the foundation", was founded in 1928 by Ronald and Atherton Richards. The property was purchased from Frank Woods, a cattle rancher. Woods had the intention of turning Kahua into a sugar plantation. Disappointed when he was unable to purchase the water from the Kehena Ditch he decided to sell. Ronald had been ranching at Hono'uil'uli on Oahu when this opportunity presented itself. Atherton was the financial backer and Ronald was to run the day to day responsibilities of the ranch. Ronald moved from Honolulu to the Big Island while Atherton remained on Oahu but visited the ranch often. Ronald married Dorothy "Da" Erdman in 1933. They had three children, Marion Kapi'olani (Pio), John Pini (Pini), and Harry

Martens (Pono). Ronald's joke was "Pio, Pini, Pono, and Pau". 6 Pini was tragically killed in a plane crash at the age of eighteen.

Cattle were shipped live to Oahu to be slaughtered and sold. There were no deep harbors at the time that would allow a larger ship near shore. The Paniolos (cowboys) would drive the cattle from Kahua down to Kawaihae. They would rest overnight before the grueling transfer ahead. The Paniolos would ride their horses into the ocean pulling the cattle on a rope. They swam them out and tied them to longboats. The cattle were then hoisted onto the interisland steamships which carried both passengers and livestock.

One of the greatest outcomes of Ronald's management is the planting of five miles of Ironwood trees along the Kohala Mountain road between 1928 and 1931. They were planted as a wind break for the cattle.

Another accomplishment by Ronald is the restoration of the abandoned missionary chapel. It was built in the 1840s in the town of Kawaihae Uka. Once abandoned, it was dismantled and restored at Kahua in the early 1950s. A fresco by renowned artist Jean Charlot currently hangs in the chapel. The work is called "Nativity at the Ranch" and was commissioned by Atherton Richards as a tribute to his friend Ronald in 1953 upon his passing. The chapel is still used today for Sunday services, weddings and funerals.

Ronald and Da were part of a web of civilian families who hosted service men on leave during World War II. The service men would take a military flight from Hickham Air Base on Oahu to Hilo. They then boarded a bus for the two-hour journey to Kahua Ranch. Days were filled with horseback riding and pheasant hunting. Elaborate meals were prepared and served by Japanese helpers wearing traditional kimonos. They slept in the bunk house behind the main house that was named "the bull pen". Planes were constantly flying over and dipping their wings as a thank you for their hospitality.

Ronald is also credited for Founding the Hawaii Cattleman's Association. The association works on educating Hawaii's cattle ranchers on practicing land conservation through the protection of its natural resources.

Ronald was known for his kindness and his leadership qualities. The ranch became a community with the multi-generational cowboy families living and working together. The decedents of Kahua's original

Hawaiian families, Ho'opai, Akina, Kainoa, Rafael, still work at the ranches today.

When Ronald suddenly passed away in 1953 the assistant manager Rally Greenwell stepped into his shoes. He managed the ranch until 1956 when Atherton moved from Oahu to take over. Atherton's nephew, Herbert "Monty" Richards became manager in 1958. Monty was a "diversified thinker" according to Pono⁸. The ranch soon started expanding into sheep, wind energy, carnations, and lettuce and tomatoes.

Kahua was split in the 1980s between the two families. Monty kept Kahua and Pono renamed his half Ponoholo Ranch. Both ranches remain in their respective families today.

There is a roadside memorial for Ronald that includes a picnic structure with a plaque in his honor on State Route 250 (Kohala Mountain Road).

Criterion C

Weli Weli is significant under Criteron C as an excellent and unique example of a Hawaii beach compound. Ronald purchased the Weli Weli land at auction in 1936. He documented his process in the Weli Weli guest books. A lot of history was documented in these books as it was traditional for all guests to leave written comments. Although unable to find any written documentation, it is widely believed that Weli Weli was used in the late 1800s by people with leprosy (Ma'i-Pake) disease to hide and avoid being caught and sent to Molokai.

"First an ancient Hawaiian settlement, then a refuge in the lava for fugitive lepers, the deserted for years except for wandering fisherman and hinano leaf gathers. I first fell in love with the spot in 1928 while throw netting along the Coast from Brownie's 9. After Willie Akau showed me the channel in, I came often until people began calling it "Ronald's Place" and even Aunt Hannah Hind called up to ask to take lauhala although it belonged to Puuwaawaa Ranch. The lauhala tree made a perfect camping spot and many weekends were spent fishing and "finding, finding, but no can find!" A glorious four days were spent here by Da, "Mrs Otis Crockett", Fij, Jack and I in 1934.

In 1932 I brought Louise and Walter Dillingham down for the day and Louise said she'd never rest until I owned the place. That started the ball rolling and in 1935 we had the place surveyed, got Uncle Robbie's 10 permission to have it withdrawn from his lease of Puuanahulu, and it was put up for auction in Hilo. Da successfully bid it in for \$135.00 plus advertising. In 1937 we got Burt Ives and George Hogan down and they seemed to catch the spirit of the place exactly as we felt it and designed a house just as we had dreamed it. With great difficulty due to inaccessibility the house was built and the first night spent in it Dec 3,1937."

Both architects Albert Ely Ives and his partner George Hogan worked on the design of the property.

Albert Ely Ives (1898-1966) was born in Newburgh, New York and graduated from the New York School of Fine and Applied Arts in 1924. He opened his own architectural office in 1927 in Wilmington, Delaware and worked there until 1934 when he began to travel. He married Kinau Wilder¹¹ in 1936 and moved to Hawaii in 1937 where he opened an architecture firm with Hogan. Ives currently has two other properties on the National Register of Historic Places, the Gibraltar house at 250 Pennsylvania Avenue, Wilmington, Delaware and the Kaneohe Ranch Building at Castle Junction in Kailua, Hawaii.

George Hogan (1914-2009) was born and raised in Honolulu. He returned from serving in World War II and began his architectural career. He designed the Hamilton Library at the University of Hawaii-Manoa, and the Pan Am building on Kapi'olani Boulevard, as well as many schools and hotels. According to his son, Jonathan Hogan, "The thing he will be remembered for are the homes he built. His legacy are custom homes. They have an amazing balance between indoor and outdoor living". That is also a perfect description of Weli Weli. In 1945 George Hogan returned to Weli Weli for his honeymoon, at which time he wrote:

"A wish that came true. But to return here after seven long years -to find the same isolated, comfortable Wele Wele touched me deeply. It had survived! So many happenings that occurred from my first visit to this spot with Da and Ronald before there were any buildings on the site, our discussions, the designing, the building of the main house from the Humuula moored a

mile offshore, sleeping out under the lauhala trees - all these came back to me, a rush of happy memories. It was good fun! Never have I enjoyed developing a building more. And now, to enjoy its beauty, its freedom, its laziness with my bride is truly a pleasure. We love it here."

Weli Weli is isolated and surrounded by miles of lava. When they were building the property many of the materials not found on the property had to be brought in by boat. The sand for the concrete was brought over in rice bags from Anaeho'omalu bay.

Ronald and Da would ride mules in from Kawaihae during World War II, when it was too dangerous to be in a boat. (Later in the war it was only okay if an American flag painted was on the deck.) When coming in over land, they used a combination of the Mamalahoa Trail (King's trail) and the beach trails. The King's trail is approximately one-mile east of Weli Weli with extremely rough lava fields between. Travel directly from the King's trail would have been impossible with the mules. The mules would be left at Akahu Kaimu (Lone Palm), two bays to the north of Weli Weli, as there was grass and fresh water for them. The rest of the journey was about thirty minutes on foot along the shore beach trails.

"Rode mules down for the first time since Dec 7th. Taking home 60 fish as no more feed. Don't know if we will ever see the place again but if the Japs land and Admiral Tojo sees this he can kiss me as I disappear over the hill. Part of Kiholo Patrol for lunch"

Traditionally access was by boat from Kawaihae. Surf and weather played a large part of planning a visit. The boat would pull up to the concrete pier and unload people and supplies. At times of high surf or surges, children and cases of beer were cautiously thrown onto the pier so the boat could get back out of the channel before the next set came in.

The lower road (Queen Ka'ahumanu Highway) was built in 1975. Soon after the road was built, access by autos was possible via a mile-long rough-cut four-wheel drive road built between Weli Weli and the new

highway. The road was built with help of Corky Brown, the manager of Pu'uwa'awa'a ranch. They had the lease on some nearby land and had a dozer available in the area.

Another feature of this property is the Anchiline fish ponds, originally restored by Ronald. Hawaiians used these natural brackish ponds to stock fish and raise them to a good eating size. The ponds have historically supported Awa, Aholehole, 'Uo'uo, brackish water crabs, Pipiwai, (brackish water snail), and Opae and Opae Ula (small red shrimp) that are still prevalent in the ponds today. On the fresher water side, O'Opu and fresh water prawns were brought down and introduced from the streams of Kohala. Koi were added as Da wanted some color. The ponds provide a softness to the visual harshness of the surrounding lava. The numerous surrounding coconut trees were planted when the property was being developed.

The property survived two tsunamis, the first on April 1, 1946 and the second on May 22, 1960.

The 1946 tsunami left significant damage to the property.

"Mother, Mary, and I (with Sam Awaa) arrived to see what the "Tidal Wave" on April 1 did. Thank God this book is safe, only being a little wet around the edges ---But the place is a mess. The cement wall on the Kawaihae side has been busted up and deposited on what was once the island in the pond on that side. The island is now part of the beach but the dwarf coconut trees are still standing. Of course, the coconut trees on the sea wall side are gone and Ron has had his private cry. The men's lauhala house is gone and also what is left of the roof is deposited in the middle pond. The glass doors on the front of the house are busted and the floor covered with ili ili and broken glass and upturned furniture. The big dining table is half in and half out of the house - having busted the great big screens on the backside. The paepae mattress and pillows were floating in the middle pond plus all the muck and debris from everywhere. We were fortunate, I know, in not having it any worse as the kitchen end of the house was OK (only a little wet) and the hikie side OK. But it is heartbreaking to see it so messy!!! It will take a lot of work to fix it up again and a lot of time to replant. Oh well we were lucky to come off as easy as we did -D.v.H"






Island of Hawaii – Location




Weli Weli Parcel Map


