Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death update:

Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death (ROD) was scientifically identified on Hawaii Island in 2014. ROD was found on the island of Kaua'i in May of 2018. ROD has affected roughly 135,000 acres of native forest on Hawai'i Island. Teams are assessing the acreage impacted on Kaua'i.

With 50,000 acres of native Hawaiian forest on the island of O'ahu, you can help prevent the spread of Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death to O'ahu in a few simple ways.

- 1. Don't move 'Ōhi'a wood or 'Ōhi'a parts inter-island.
- 2. Don't transport 'Ōhi'a inter-island buds, flowers, wood, etc.
- 3. Avoid injuring live, standing 'Ōhi'a trees, this puts the tree at significantly higher risk of infection.
- 4. Clean forestry tools, hiking boots, chainsaws, etc. and then spray with 70% rubbing alcohol.
- 5. Wash vehicles (including the undercarriage and tires) with soap and water to remove mud after traveling off-road or in an area with ROD.
