### October "Together We Farm" Workshop

This October, West Oahu SWCD and partners will offer the first of 4 workshops building farmer capacity for sustainable land and ag practices through the "Together We Farm" education series. Farmers guided the development of these workshops, which include on-farm learning, peer-to-peer demonstrations, guidance from field research experts, resource kits to execute what was learned, and complimentary on-farm support. We did our best to schedule around markets and "typical" packing/processing times.

Focused on soil health, nutrient management, and best management practices, this first workshop will be offered in both English (October 20 at Kahumana Farm) and Thai (October 26) from 4-7pm.

FREE: Confidential FSMA Water Testing

UPDATE: SUPPORT NOW AVAILABLE STATEWIDE Farmers and producers of fresh produce can now secure free confidential water testing for E. coli across the state through the end of 2018.

Trained staff from partners will visit your site and collect samples, which will be tested to FSMA standards. A confidential report will be provided to the producer. This effort will help with FSMA compliance.

#### Youth Loans

The Farm Service Agency makes loans to youth to establish and operate agricultural income-producing projects in connection with 4-H clubs, FFA and other agricultural groups. Projects must be planned and operated with the help of the organization advisor, produce sufficient income to repay the loan and provide the youth with practical business and educational experience. The maximum loan amount is \$5000.

Youth loan funds must be used only to pay the expenses associated with an approved project.

- · Buy livestock, seed, equipment and supplies
- · Buy, rent or repair needed tools and equipment
- · Pay operating expenses for the project

# Youth Loan Eligibility Requirements:

- Be a citizen of the United States (which includes Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands) or a legal resident alien
- Be 10 years to 20 years of age
- · Comply with FSA's general eligibility requirements
- Be unable to get a loan from other sources
- Conduct a modest income-producing project in a supervised program of work as outlined above
- Demonstrate capability of planning, managing and operating the project under guidance and assistance from a project adviser. The project supervisor must recommend the youth loan applicant, along with providing adequate supervision.
