SUBJECT: APPROVAL OF A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE DIVISION OF FORESTRY AND WILDLIFE AND THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS FOR MANAGEMENT OF A RARE PLANT EXCLOSURE ON TAX MAP KEY (1) 8-9-008: PORTION 001, WAI'ANAE, O'AHU.

> REQUEST APPROVAL OF DECLARATION OF EXEMPTION FROM CHAPTER 343, HRS ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR THE PROJECT.

REQUEST FOR DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY TO THE CHAIRPERSON TO NEGOTIATE, APPROVE, EXECUTE, AMEND AND EXTEND MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING, RIGHT-OF-ENTRY AND RELEASE OF LIABILITY AGREEMENTS, FOR DIVISION OF FORESTRY AND WILDLIFE FOR MANAGEMENT OF A RARE PLANT EXCLOSURE AT WAI'ANAE, O'AHU.

SUMMARY:

This Board Submittal requests approval in concept of Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Division of Forestry and Wildlife (DOFAW) and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL), for management of a rare plant exclosure (Exhibit A), which is located on Hawaiian Home Lands. The Division also requests approval of a declaration of exemption from Chapter 343, HRS environmental compliance requirements, and delegation of authority to the Chairperson to negotiate, approve, execute, amend and extend MOU, Right-Of-Entries (ROE) and/or Release of Liability Agreements, as appropriate, with DHHL related to this project.

LOCATION:

Portion of Government DHHL lands situated in Wai'anae, O'ahu identified by Tax Map Key (1) 8-9-008: por. 001 (Exhibit A).

TERM OF MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING:

The term of the Memorandum of Understanding shall be for a period of ten years.

BACKGROUND:

In 2015, DOFAW conducted an analysis of the Nānākuli Forest Reserve (FR) boundary. This analysis revealed that a portion of TMK (1) 8-9-008:001 that was set aside as Nānākuli FR by Governor's Proclamation in 1930, was previously set aside as Hawaiian Home Land by the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (HHCA) in 1921. This area was later withdrawn from the Forest Reserve System by Executive Order 3270 in 1984, and is under the jurisdiction of DHHL.

Due to an error in DOFAW's records, the area was presumed to still be under DOFAW's jurisdiction when a 0.00371 acre rare plant exclosure was constructed in 2011 to protect the last remaining na'u (*Gardenia brighamii*) growing in the wild on O'ahu (Exhibit A). The exclosure was built by the Plant Extinction Prevention Program (PEPP), with the help of several agencies including DOFAW, Board of Water Supply, O'ahu Army Natural Resources Program, and Ka'ala Farms. PEPP is the primary program that manages the exclosure and the federally protected wild na'u within the fence. Ongoing management actions include weed control, na'u fruit and vegetative collections, fence maintenance, and outplanting. If long term access can be secured, future management actions may include outplanting of propagated na'u within the exclosure.

DISCUSSION:

In January 2015, DOFAW contacted DHHL Land Branch to initiate discussion concerning the management of the rare plant exclosure in question. DHHL has expressed support for entering into an agreement that would allow the continued management of the na'u exclosure by DOFAW, stating that DLNR is better equipped to manage this rare resource. Both agencies agreed that a Memorandum of Understanding is the best option to allow for continued management of this federally protected endangered species.

DOFAW is interested in entering into a Memorandum of Understanding with DHHL for the term of 10 years for the continued management of the rare plant exclosure in Nānākuli to allow PEPP to maintain and monitor the exclosure protecting the last wild na'u individual. These activities

will serve to protect the last remaining wild population and provide a potential outplanting site for more na'u in the future.

DOFAW is requesting permission to access the endangered species plant exclosure to conduct fence maintenance, weed control, collect rare plant material, and conduct future outplanting of na'u. In exchange, PEPP in conjunction with DOFAW will provide management for endangered species on DHHL land.

CHAPTER 343 - ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT:

In accordance with "Exemption List for the Department of Land and Natural Resources, reviewed and concurred upon by the Environmental Council on June 5, 2015," the proposed activities are exempt from the preparation of an environmental assessment. Specifically, the proposed activities fall under Exemption Class No. 1 Item 5, Item 7, and Item 33. Refer to attached Exemption Notification labeled Exhibit B.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

That the Board:


- 1. Approve a Memorandum of Understanding between the State of Hawai'i Division of Forestry and Wildlife and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands for management of a rare plant exclosure at Wai'anae, O'ahu, Tax Map Key: (1) 8-9-008: portion 001.
- 2. Declare that, after considering the potential effects of the proposed dispositions provided by Chapter 343, HRS, and Chapter 11-200, HAR, this project will likely have minimal or no significant effect on the environment and is therefore exempt from the preparation of an environmental assessment.
- 3. Delegate to the Chairperson the authority to negotiate, approve, execute, amend and extend Memorandum of Understanding, Right-Of-Entries and Release of Liability Agreements, as appropriate, between the State of Hawai'i Division of Forestry and Wildlife and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands for management of rare plant exclosure at Wai'anae, O'ahu, Tax Map Key: (1) 8-9-008: portion 001, subject to:
 - a. Review and approval as to form by the Department of the Attorney General; and
 - b. Such other terms and conditions as may be prescribed by the Chairperson to best serve the interests of the State.
