SUBJECT: REQUEST APPROVAL TO EXTEND THE TERM OF LEASE NO. H-

89-13, PACIFIC WEST FUELS INC., FOR AN ADDITIONAL FIFTEEN YEARS TO AMORTIZE THE COST OF SUBSTANTIAL IMPROVEMENTS SITUATED AT LAHAINA SMALL BOAT HARBOR, ISLAND OF MAUI, HAWAII, TAX MAP KEY (2) 4-6-001:

014, 017 (POR.).

REQUEST:

The Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation ("DOBOR") is seeking approval from the Board of Land and Natural Resources ("Board") to authorize a Fifteen (15) year lease extension to amortize the cost of completed improvements to the demised premises in the total amount of \$219,734.79 (\$147,372.67 of cost incurred in the past two years & \$72,362.12 spent in 2014-2015). DOBOR is also seeking Board approval to negotiate capital improvements to the Lahaina Small Boat Harbor. Pacific West Fuels, Inc. stated "they are concerned about the state of disrepair of the wharf railings, steps, and marlin hoist and would be willing to cover the costs of making repairs up to \$150,000 as part of the lease extension."

LEGAL REFERENCE:

Sections 171-36 (b) (3), Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), as amended.

LOCATION:

Portion of Government lands situated at Lahaina Small Boat Harbor, Lahaina, Island of Maui, identified by Tax Map Key: (2) 4-6-001:014 and 017 (por.).

AREA:

The lease area contains approximately 1282 sq. ft. of fast land, consisting of approximately 146.5 sq. ft. for fuel dispensers and a non-exclusive easement of approximately 1,188 sq. ft. for subsurface fuel storage tanks and related equipment, see attached EXHIBIT A.

ZONING:

State Land Use District: Urban, County of Maui

CZO: HD-1 Historic District

TRUST LAND STATUS:

Section 5(b) lands of the Hawaii Admission Act. YES

DHHL 30% entitlement lands pursuant to the Hawaii State Constitution: NO

CURRENT USE STATUS:

Marine Fueling Facility open 24 hours per day, seven days per week, 365 days per year.

CHARACTER OF USE:

Marine Fueling Facility

ANNUAL RENTAL:

\$1770 per annum plus 5.25% of the annual gross receipts in excess of the minimum annual rent.

TERM OF LEASE:

30 years, commencing November 21, 1989 and expiring November 20, 2019. Lease extension if approved Nov 20, 2019 to Nov 19, 2034.

REMARKS:

Pacific West Fuels, Inc. (PWF) is presently occupying the Premises under the terms and conditions of Lease No. H-89-13 (the "Lease") which originated on November 21, 1989 and expires on November 20, 2019. The last rental reopening occurred on November 20, 2004 in which the annual base rent increased by thirty percent. There is no future rental reopening.

The applicant desires to continue to use the Premises per the "Lease Character of Use" as a marine fueling facility. According to Pacific West Fuels, Inc.'s lease, they will have to remove their equipment including fuel tanks prior to the end of lease and this would cause a major interruption in the Lahaina Small Boat Harbor.

PWF is requesting a 15-year lease extension to amortize the cost of already completed improvements to the demised premises in the amount of \$219,734 (see EXHIBIT B). This lease extension would enable PWF to recover the \$219,734 of capital improvement cost they incurred doing the following: (1) repaired the fuel equipment and related leasehold improvements that support it; (2) installed stainless steel ratcheting hose reels and extended reach hoses; and (3) upgraded all their electronic control equipment and software. PWF provided itemize invoices to DOBOR depicting most of the capital improvement cost (see EXHIBIT B).

If the Board grants PWF a fifteen-year extension, PWF would like to work with the State of Hawaii to make the necessary safety repairs at Lahaina Small Boat Harbor up to \$150,000. These safety repairs are the responsibility of the State of Hawaii, but PWF is willing to repair and fund the repair of the following: replace all existing railings, mounting brackets, gates with similar design; remove and replace all concrete stairs that are crumbling; resetting the marlin hoist into reinforced concrete using corrosion resistant rebar. PWF is willing to manage the project, and or only fund the repairs. PWF's only stipulation is that the State of Hawaii would provide the plans and specification for the desired repairs and assume the cost for any permits required.

PWF also provided a video which reveals the needed repairs at the Lahaina Small Boat Harbor, which can be viewed online: https://vimeo.com/249762621

DOBOR supports the continued use of the premises for the stated purpose since any disruption would cause a major interruption in the Lahaina Small Boat Harbor. Also, PWF has successfully and safely operated this fueling facility since 1990 with minimal interruptions in service except for maintenance repairs.

After consulting with DOBOR Engineering, DOBOR also recommends that the State provide PWF with the plans and specifications along with the right-of-entry permits required to complete the safety repairs detailed above.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Land and Natural Resources:

Authorize the issuance of a 15-year lease extension with rental reopening's every five years, covering the subject area for the purpose of Marine Fueling Facility, Lahaina, Island of Maui, under the terms and conditions cited above, which are by this reference incorporated herein and further subject to the following:

- 1. The standard terms and conditions of the most current lease form, as may be amended from time to time;
- 2. Such other terms and conditions as may be prescribed by the Chairperson to best serve the interests of the State.



Aloha Mr. Russell:

I am writing to request a negotiated extension, of not less than ten years, of Pacific West Fuels, Inc.'s (PWF) lease with the State of Hawaii, Harbor Lease No. H-89-13 to enable PWF to recover the \$147,372.67 of costs it has incurred to do the following: (a) repair our fuel equipment and the related leasehold improvements that support it; and (b) improve operational efficiency by installing stainless steel ratcheting hose reels and extended reach hoses. In 2014 and 2015 PWF also spent \$72,362.12 replacing all its electronic control equipment and software. The accompanying schedule lists the safety and efficiency improvements made voluntarily by PWF during the two previous years to enable PWF to fulfill its obligations under this lease, which expires November 21, 2019.

PWF built and has now successfully and safely operated this fueling facility since 1990 with minimal interruptions in service on those few days when repairs were being done. Although the lease only requires PWF to dispense fuel 12 hours per day, for the convenience of our customers and the public, PWF makes fuel available 24 hours per day, seven days per week and 365 days per year.

PWF is concerned about the state of disrepair of the wharf railings, steps and marlin hoist and would be willing to contribute \$150,000 towards the estimated costs of making such repairs, so that the wharf can be made safe for our customers and the general public. We'd need at least a 15-year extension of the lease to recover both our \$219,734.79 of costs already incurred since 2014 (\$147,372.67 in the past two years) and PWF's proposed contribution to Hawaii of \$150,000 towards the costs to be incurred for the safety repairs we've documented in a video sent to you recently. Attached is a rough estimate from a reputable Maui contractor, of such costs under two alternatives, to replace what exists with similar materials, and using superior materials that should require much less maintenance and last for many years.

If PWF were to make the repairs, we'd request that the State provide the plans and specifications for the desired repairs and any permits required for us to contract the work or preferably a right of entry permit. Alternatively, if the State was to do the repairs we'd reimburse the actual costs of such repairs against invoices up to a maximum of \$150,000.

I've also attached some information about our Company and the reasons I think it is in Hawaii's and our customers and the boating public's best interest to extend our lease. Thank you in advance for consideration of our request.

Why we Believe it is in Hawaii's, our Customers and the Boating Public's Interest For the State of Hawaii to Negotiate an Extension of Lease Number H-89-13

- 1. Pacific West Fuels, Inc. (PWF) not only built the existing facility to be the safest fuel dock of its kind back in 1989 in partnership with the State of Hawaii but has also operated the site safely and efficiently for 28 years. Fuel has been made available to the boating public continuously for over 28 years on a 24 hour a day, seven days per week and 365 days per year basis. During the few brief interruptions of operation necessitated by safety repairs, diesel fuel was made available to our customers in cooperation with Hawaiian Petroleum.
- 2. Although the site was intended to be operated continuously on an unattended basis, PWF has a local employee to provide assistance to boaters when required.
- 3. Approximately 80% of every dollar PWF receives for fuel and service is spent in Hawaii, most in Maui.
- 4. PWF is committed to responsible operation as evidenced by its voluntary expenditure of approximately \$220,000 between 2014 and today (\$147,372.67 in the past two years) to renew and replace equipment it deemed to be a safety risk (despite passing local inspection). We made these investments to protect the public and to ensure continuous operation through the remaining two years of our existing lease, knowing that our subsequent request for lease extension to enable the Company to recover these costs might be denied.
- 5. PWF is willing to go beyond its requirements to keep its equipment in operating order, to include paying for a large portion of the maintenance deferred for two decades by Hawaii that we believe has now created safety hazards on the Lahaina Boat Harbor wharf. As stated in our cover letter, PWF is willing to fund up to \$150,000 of the estimated \$225,000 of costs to replace 200 lineal feet of badly deteriorated railings; replace and properly build new steps leading from the upper to lower landings; and to reseat the marlin hoist which presently is affixed to broken concrete and creates what we believe to be a life-threatening hazard.
- 6. PWF has many hundreds of thousands of dollars invested in its equipment. The existing lease requires PWF to remove all the equipment it installed by the end of the lease. Doing so would severely disrupt wharf operations for not less than six months and possibly a year or longer. And all the equipment would need to be replaced at great cost to a new lessee, who would likely then need to pass such additional costs on to the boaters in the form of higher fuel prices. By extending the lease Hawaii would avoid any disruption in operations.
- 7. Hawaii has vetted PWF for 28 years and PWF has proven to be reliable and responsible. New operators might not be as capable and dependable.
- 8. PWF has timely paid the State of Hawaii over \$100,000 per year in rent for each of the last ten years is confident future annual rents paid to the State would exceed \$100,000 annually.

PACIFIC WEST FUELS, INC. VOLUNTARY CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS 2016 - 2018 To Ensure Safe and Continuous Operations Despite Lease Scheduled to End 11-21-19

When Gary Strutz became President of PWF in late 2015, he obtained an A/B UST Operator's license from Hawaii and then did a thorough inspection of PWF's operating equipment for safe, continuous and efficient operations. His inspection raised his concern about the north side dispenser's ability to continue operating safely through the end of the lease despite being passed by independent inspectors. He then got his shareholders to approve making the following expenditures to ensure safe and continuous operations despite lease expiring 11-21-19. There wasn't time to request a lease extension prior to commencement, due to narrow window between cruise ship moorings which was a condition imposed by the Hawaii Dept. of Land and Natural Resources.







Currently, my estimator is buried, so this is very generic until sometime next week. This is a guestimate and we will go into further detail to supply a better cost estimate at a later date.

Scope of work

Remove, sandblast, powder coat and reset hoist into new concrete footing

Remove and replace all stairways, 5 in total

Remove and replace all existing wood railings at approximately 222 LF.

We can do this in cedar or Ipe lumber. The pine has a life expectancy of about 12 years. If we use cedar you'll get about 20 years. But with pine and cedar, it will rot and be eaten by local insects(termites, carpenter bees, etc.). We recommend Ipe.

Cedar and Redwood are the regular materials used for decking, but they will only last **about 25 years** with good maintenance. We offer a material that can last over **75 years**, is termite and mold resistant, low maintenance, and 100% natural (free of chemicals). 

William,

Thank very much for assisting us. Pacific West Fuels, Inc. built the fuel dock working in conjunction with the State of Hawaii back in 1989-1990. Our lease expires in a couple years and we are in the process of negotiating an extension due in part to having invested over \$220,000 to improve our equipment and facilities in the past few years.

We keep our equipment and facilities in good repair and safe operating condition. Hawaii has neglected maintenance and safety issues at the wharf for decades and I've expressed my concern to the state that these safety issues place our customers and Hawaii tourists at risk. As

part of our negotiations I have offered that PWF would invest up to \$150,000 to make the safety repairs which we believe are the following:

- 1. Replace all existing railings, mounting brackets, gates with similar design.
- 2. Remove an replace all concrete stairs that are breaking due to uncoated rebar having been used originally, which is now corroding, expanding and cracking the concrete. New steps would be reinforced with corrosion resistant rebar.
- 3. Remove concrete into which marlin hoist is affixed. Sand and powder coat marlin hoist and reset if with stainless bolts into corrosion resistant reinforced concrete pad.

The CA general contractor that filmed the video John provided to you had estimated that if he were to do this work in the very expensive Silicon Valley where he and I both reside, it could be done for \$100,000 or less. He figured it would cost more in Hawaii because just about everything there does. He also recommended we use better material for the railings but didn't specifically mention any product. He said upgrading the material could add \$50,000 to the cost. Coincidently, PWF has saved around \$150,000 over the years for major improvements, so that coupled with his very rough, quick and dirty estimate is how I came up with offering to spend \$150,000 for such repairs.

The Hawaii property manager with whom I'm negotiating, wanted a more detailed quote from a Maui contractor to include with my lease renewal proposal that must be submitted to him tomorrow.

I would greatly appreciate getting from you a proposal no later than tomorrow morning, to make the repairs identified above under two scenarios, the first to replace at current standard and the second to upgrade the railings using a better quality material such as what you mentioned.

As a token of our appreciation for your efforts, I've told Johnny PWF will pay the cost of a local day fishing charter for you and a couple others.

Thanks again for your help and also for your distinguished military service. I hope to meet you next time I'm in Hawaii.

PWF paid for, owns and maintains the fuel equipment and leasehold improvements it constructed on the site it leases from the State of Hawaii.

Our dual-walled, fiberglass, underground fuel storage tanks and three dockside fuel dispensers are continuously monitored for fuel levels and leaks thereby eliminating fuel outages and the fire and spill hazards that existed when fuel was dispensed exclusively from the back of trucks or containers.

PWF has safely dispensed diesel fuel and gasoline to its customers, which include most of the boaters and boating companies berthing at the LSBH, since 1990. Except for short periods of downtime for necessary equipment repairs, we have made fuel available 24 hours per day, seven days per week, every day of the year, which is double the Hawaii imposed minimum hours of daily operation.

Our goal is to provide safe and convenient fuel delivery to our customers. In addition to 24/7/365 delivery and continuous safety monitoring, we strive to keep our equipment in good working order and to make fuel delivery as efficient as possible.
