Aloha,

I am writing to ask the BLNR to issue the right of entry for the 5013(C) Popoki Place Cat Sanctuary so they can utilize State Agricultural lands on the island of O'ahu. As a wildlife biologist and a cat lover living on the island of O'ahu, I see the benefit of this use of land for both the native conservation community as well as the animal welfare community. It would be such an asset for a cat sanctuary to be developed on our island.

The issue of free roaming cats and the crisis that cat overpopulation has on native endemic wildlife including our threatened and endangered birds, is devastating throughout the Hawaiian islands. Providing rescue groups with the resources to take in cats living near native wildlife and vulnerable ecosystems, and putting them in an enclosed escape proof, contained environment would benefit native wildlife immensely. Furthermore, free roaming cats live a dangerous life prone to disease, sickness, and injury. Allowing the cat rescue group to have enough land to take in stray/ feral cats, spay and neuter and provide vet care and prevent further breeding in these sensitive areas is key. Also, having an island sanctuary that exists to house these cats until they can potentially be adopted out and or given permanent residency away from the potential to harm native birds, is extremely helpful to the community.

I have been a cat foster on the Hawaiian islands, and currently have two rescue kitties of my own that were found in a rural spot on Big Island. They are the most loving companion animals and safe from harm as well as safe from potentially harming native protected birds or monk seals through the entry of toxoplasmosis into the natural environment and marine environment. The development of a cat sanctuary on O'ahu like they have on Lānā'i would be incredibly valuable to our community. Please issue a right of entry so Popoki Place can use these important lands for their sanctuary.

My name is Chris Thompson, and I am the Director of Lucky Paws Animal Foundation, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization based in Honolulu that is dedicated to the rescue, rehabilitation, and rehoming of sick, injured, and at-risk cats across Oʻahu. (<u>LuckyPaws.org</u>)

I am writing to express our strong support for the approval of a Right of Entry permit to Pōpoki Place Oʻahu Cat Sanctuary for due diligence activities on the North Shore parcel listed in Agenda Item D-6.

Lucky Paws has seen firsthand the overwhelming number of free-roaming cats across the island, many of whom come from environmentally sensitive areas. Our shelter is constantly operating at or above capacity, and like many rescues, we face difficult decisions about who we can help. A large-scale sanctuary like Pōpoki Place—designed specifically to house cats removed from areas where native wildlife are at risk—would be a critical addition to the animal welfare and environmental protection landscape in Hawai'i.
