My name is Leslie Witten. I serve on the Board of Directors for Oʻahu Cat Sanctuary. I also lead a school-run cooperative TNRM program of over 50 people at Le Jardin Academy in which we humanely manage the cat population on campus while working to protect the biodiversity at Kawainui Marsh located next to our campus. Additionally, I volunteer for several rescue organizations such as Cat People of Oʻahu and Poi Dog and Popoki to help rehome cats from the landscape. I also independently TNR in my Waialua/Haleiwa community, frequently supporting sterilization and rehoming of cats at the Haleiwa Harbor and also in Kaʻena Point State Park. I am writing to request that you grant right of entry to Popoki Place Oahu Cat Sanctuary. This would be the first step in establishing a partial solution to the free-roaming cat population on Oahu.

Most people, whether they love cats or hate them, want to reduce the number of unowned cats on our island.

Cats threaten ground-nesting birds. A fenced in cat sanctuary would provide a place for cats removed from protected habitat.

Cats can cause toxoplasmosis, which is a threat to ocean mammals such as monk seals. Litter boxes on the sanctuary would be managed very carefully.

Shelters on Oahu do not have the capacity to take in all the kittens being born and pet cats being abandoned on our island. While spaying and neutering cats is the ultimate solution, a cat sanctuary would provide a pressure-relief valve for over-crowded shelters. I volunteer at Lucky Paws Shelter, and while we try to get as many cats as possible adopted, some cats are not socialized enough (i.e. are too feral) to be adopted. We would love to have a sanctuary where we could send those cats. They are miserable in cages.

A large-scale cat sanctuary is a critical missing link in managing the free-roaming cat population on Oahu.

Leilei Shih, PhD, Sierra Club National Marine Team Chair sums it up: "Popoki Place is the best solution with the highest potential I have learned of to date, and the first solution that makes sense from every perspective."
