

Throughout the years, astronomical development on top of Mauna Kea has caused historic harm that has imposed on the Hawaiian people, and the sacredness of this land. This is a recurring concern that has fallen on deaf ears, therefore, the growing public is in opposition!!! Stand with us against the excessive overreach by Governor Green and adopt a process that exemplifies transparency and accountability in alignment with all applicable laws to uphold the cherished integrity, history, and cultural appropriation of our beloved Mauna ā Wākea.

To the Maunakea Stewardship and Oversight Authority:

Aloha Board Members,

My name is Leilani Lindsey Ka'apuni. I reside at Pi'ihonua, Hilo, Hawai'i. I am a wife and mother of seven, and grandmother of 15. I work for the Univeristy of Hawai'i at Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani College of Hawaiian Language. I am a member of the Native Hawaiian Education Council and the former president of Hui Aloha 'Āina and Nā Wāhine 'o Kamehameha of the Royal Order of Kamehameha. I am a cultural practitioner and a protector of ka wai kapu a Kāne me Kanaloa from the summit of Maunakea, and a kia'i o Pōhakuloa, currently in the NAGPRA process with the US Army over iwi kūpuna disturbed and uncovered at the Pōhakuloa Training Area.

I am submitting written testimony to you via email in response to Josh Green's October 24, 2025 letter to TMT officials, Henry Yang and Saku Tsuneta. That letter, also signed by all four members of Hawai'i's US congressional delegation, is extremely offensive and insulting to the thousands of Hawaiians who have stood in protection of Maunakea for decades. I was among those arrested on Maunakea in 2015 and 2019 for stopping TMT construction vehicles from ascending the Mauna on the Maunakea Access Road, which road belongs to Hawaiians. And I am prepared, along with thousands of Hawaiians, to block that road again, if necessary.

In 2019, Josh Green visited the kupuna tent on the Ala Kupuna to speak with many of us who were there. He acted as if he was concerned about our well-being. We now know that his visit was nothing more than a political stunt and a photo op. Similarly, the current TMT project manager, Fengchuan Liu, has visited with many Hawai'i Island community members to "listen to their concerns" and act as if he cared about Hawaiians' perspectives. He is a liar and a snake, and 1,500 community members look forward to seeing him again to tell him that directly.

I ask the board members of the MKSOA to relay to the governor that the Hawaiian people are lineal descendants of Wākea and Papa, of Hāloa and Hoʻohokukalani, of Kūkahauʻula and Lilinoe, and other ancestors who once dwelt on Maunakea and whose bones are buried there. We trace our lineage back to Wākea, Sky Father, over 60 generations ago. The piko of our family members have been placed in Lake Waiau for generations, connecting us forever to the piko of Maunakea and placing upon us the kuleana to protect the sacred waters of Kāne and the summit of the Mauna. Remind the governor that the summit of Maunakea is a conservation district, the State's highest protected land status. If he and Hawaiʻi's US congressional delegation will not protect that conservation district, Hawaiians will.

Nevertheless, we must thank Josh Green, Brian Schatz, Mazie Hirono, Ed Case and Jill **To**kuda for showing us their position and their intent and for inspiring 200,000 Hawaiians to register to vote in the next elections. The time for true change and a return to pono is now.

Aloha MKSOA Board Members,

I am testifying in opposition to the use of a decommissioned site for the Thirty Meter Telescope project.

While a decommissioned site is in fact already disturbed and building upon it does seem to make sense initially, the monstrosity that is the Thirty Meter Telescope would not fit solely on the disturbed site, additional disruption would need to take place at an alarming scale, making the fact that it is previously disturbed a moot point.

As thousands of protectors of Mauna Kea have already shown, back in 2015, again in 2019, and maintaining vigilance ever since via online platforms, there is a strong commitment to protect further desecration of this sacred site (the entire Mauna Kea) from a project this large. This commitment of protectors, both Native Hawaiian and non-Native alike, has not lessened or died off, it still remains strong, and you will see the swarms of people physically standing again for one of the most sacred sites in all of Hawaii, if the Thirty Meter Telescope tries to build on that mountain again.

As was expressed in 2019, our concerns is that the land is sacred, the land is also above a large aquifer, and Native Hawaiians, the indigenous people to this land, do NOT consent to this project. Survey after survey has shown that the vast majority surveyed is against this project, this is not merely a minority speaking against it with a loud voice.

Establishing a process to permit the use of a decommissioned site for projects that <u>won't cause</u> <u>additional disruption</u> to the land is understandable, but anything that causes additional disruption will, especially one of the scale of the Thirty Meter Telescope, be unacceptable, and the protectors will show up again.

To support building the Thirty Meter Telescope on Mauna Kea is to disregard the opinions (lack of approval) and beliefs (ie its sacredness) of the indigenous people of these lands, and risk contamination of some of the most pristine conservation lands in all of Hawaii, all in the name of science and money. I am sorely disappointed in these elected officials for sending such a letter, as they do not represent the sentiment of thousands of their constituents.

Hawaii does not to be a leader in the astronomy or space exploration space. We have the most diverse ecosystems and are one of the most isolated group of islands in the world. Let's not look to space and other planets for scientific research, let's look down at our lands and oceans, and research what can help the planet today. Let's be a leader in research that improves the health of our own planet and the people on her.

It is challenging to testify in kapu aloha after nearly seven years of testifying and showing up in kapu aloha for majestic sacred Mauna a Wākea. My name is Keʻala Lee Loy, a retired teacher, school administrator, kānaka and Aloha 'Āina.

If your intent is to insult the intellectual and emotional intelligence of kānaka, then you have certainly achieved that intention. What exactly is difficult to comprehend as we continue to say "A'ole TMT!!!!"

There is no compromise with Mauna a Wākea, the University of Hawai'i has already committed more destruction and over-build of Mauna Kea than it ever should have without clear transparency and proper oversite of existing telescopes. The goal is to remove each telescope as each becomes obsolete and is decommissioned and properly removed.

The Governor's suggestion to relocate TMT (btw, changing TMT to TIO to confuse the multitudes is a great ploy, but it's not going to work) to a disturbed site as suggested by a Hawai'i community is ludicrous and again insulting to the intellectual and emotional intelligence of kānaka. Furthermore, what Hawai'i community exactly is Gov Josh Green referring to? Is it the same community who supported TMT that created a great divide throughout the pae 'āina? If so, you are addressing the wrong community.

A Star-Advertiser editorial ("<u>Keep astronomy on Mauna Kea summit,</u>" Our View, Jan. 31) called astronomy in Hawaii the "perfect brainstorm intersect of science, economy, geography and culture" — with astronomy coming out ahead as "thriving," "successful" and "contributing" \$221 million to the annual economy

In February 2022 a brilliant rebuttal was written by Professor Williamson Chang of the Richardson School of Law titled; In Hawaii, a pristine Mauna Kea is a moral imperative. It speaks even louder in our current political and economic environment with the premature and forced negotiations between the military and state officials regarding the end of the 65 year lease of the Pohakuloa Training Area.

Professor William Chang's main points are captured here:

1. The article gives little weight to the importance of Mauna Kea, the value of a pristine Mauna Kea to Native Hawaiians, and those who share their sense of self.

- 2. A utilitarian approach that makes decisions simply based on the preferences of the many, and simply weighs economic benefits, or progress, is wrong in this case.
- 3. It is wrong because it produces injustice. If we applied the utilitarian approach to all decisions, then minorities would always lose.
- 4. Justice is not measured by balancing economic benefits against the universal moral rights of each individual. Equating the economy with the intrinsic value of a sacred place is trying to compare apples to oranges. The worth of a person is not reducible to economic values, or service to others. All who have worth or value as individuals have this value equally. We must never treat people in ways that fail to show proper respect for their unique value.
- 5. Yet, this is what we do, when as the editorial suggests, we weigh science, economy and geography as more important than the distinctive value that people have as individuals. This balancing of economic interests, this use of preference polls is to treat Native Hawaiians as a mere means to promote the ends of others. Any such, disrespectful treatment is wrong no matter what the consequences. Moral rights are universal. Moral rights are inalienable. Native Hawaiians did not lose their rights because of the overthrow, annexation or settlement of Hawaii by others. Moral rights are equal rights.
- 6. If there are sacred places, be it the Arizona Memorial, the World Trade Center, Mount Fuji, Mount Kilimanjaro, or the many sacred forests, rivers, animals and reserves, there are sacred places in Hawaii.
- 7. Mauna Kea is more than just a mountain. Mauna Kea has a crucial place in the world of Hawaiians. It is the epitome of the religious core of Native Hawaiians.
- 8. It is an essential part of a world view unique to Hawaii a world view that we see in action every day in the form of the aloha spirit, malama aina, pono and kuleana.
- 9. Finally, Hawaii is the homeland of Native Hawaii. For those who came from other countries, that which is sacred is protected by national sovereignty. If what is sacred to Hawaiians is not protected in Hawaii, then where?

Again, this was published by Williamson Chang, a professor of law at *William* S. Richardson School of Law, *University* of Hawaii-Manoa, Feb. 2022. Not much has changed.

- Prioritizing restoration and decommissioning of existing telescopes and facilities.
- Supporting Kānaka Maoli leadership, decision-making, and active guardianship of the mauna.

Protecting Mauna a Wākea is not only about stopping a telescope; it's about restoring balance and honoring the sacred responsibilities we hold to the land, the water, and future generations.

Aloha Chair Komeiji, Vice Chairs Wong-Wilson, Matsuda, and members of the Mauna Kea Stewardship and Oversight Authority,

We are Hui Aloha 'Āina o Hilo, and we are writing to you today in urgency, regarding the letter sent to TMT International Observatory by State of Hawai'i Governor Josh Green.

We are Kanaka, we are descendants of Mauna Kea, we are Aloha 'Āina, we are residents, we are neighbors, we are parents, we are youth, we are the ones who will have to answer for the decisions of our time – especially atop of Mauna Kea.

The October 24th letter from Josh Green and the Hawai'i Congressional delegation is highly disappointing, disturbing, and should be of the greatest concern to this advisory board.

The letter, addressed to the TMT International Observatory, not to the people they are elected to represent, states that they will work with the MKSOA and UH to "promptly establish a clear and transparent procedure to obtain the necessary permits associated with a decommissioned site". Additionally, this news comes timely, as other reports are being made that TIO has found alternative and "promising" sites elsewhere, to proceed with their Thirty Meter Telescope. The motivation by Green to send such a disturbing letter shows that his interest in Mauna Kea does not lie in its stewardship, but rather as a bargaining chip.

While the proposed construction site may have changed, no other conditions have. The summit remains a conservation district, and the source waters of all life that depends on it from below. The refrain of thousands across the pae 'āina remains Kū Kia'i Mauna.

During previous contested case hearings, UH/ TMT previously stated the TMT could not be put on decommissioned sites because it is too big for the summit. If TMT is going to be redesigned to make it small enough to move - then all the permits need to be redone - conservation district, sublease, EIS, management plan, etc. - and all of the public processes associated with them.

The letter is in disturbing alignment with so much we are seeing across U.S.-occupied Hawai'i, where politicians and corporations talk behind closed doors, bump fists, and attempt to roll over the will and peace of the community.

We strongly urge the Maunakea Stewardship and Oversight Authority to resist this excessive overreach by Josh Green and congressional delegates. Their attempts to consolidate power and clear a path for the Thirty Meter Telescope on Maunakea only shows their lack of judgement in all matters concerning stewardship. Hold all parties accountable to the law, for the safety of all you have been tasked to protect – Mauna Kea

We also remind the Authority that the summit of Maunakea is not just sacred; these are Hawaiian national lands and waters that the Hawaiian Kingdom government (and its people) never relinquished - they are not for sale. Allowing such a monstrosity atop our summit is no different than the act of severing the bond of our ancestors, Papa and Wākea – whom join there, and from which all life comes forth.

I'd like to open up my testimony opposing TMT in its entirety and specifically submitting written testimony today to oppose the TMT to be developed on an alternate decommissioning site with 'ike about Wisdom.

Depth =wisdom,and we are asking you to make wise decisions in your roles in MKSOA and ask you to go deep and be wise. The following is a message shared to me by spirit a few months ago which I'd like to share with you for a gentle reminder "To summon the Wisdom that has already been entrusted to you, born with you, in your bones, in your blood, in your breathe, in your being, one must return into the womb of life, the wai or womb of ALL Life...wisdom is not acquired...it was gifted to you as a requirement to accompany you on this Lifes Journey, to accompany you into the next Lifes journey as your eternal guide...this is the message"

Be wise and Do not forget the land you stand on! Our Land, the aboriginal peoples of Hawai'i, Kanaka, which we share in being proper stewards and share in oversight.

We ask that you all be mindful and wise while you continue to Oversee our Mauna and operate Authority over decisions regarding the development of the TMT or any other developments affecting our Mauna as to Not exclude other protective measures that will be deliberated amongst MKSOA.

I ask that you Listen to those who were granted the seat at your table who also made their stance and sitting with you now as they represent our voice not only of today but the duration of this fight up. We made our stance clear, we do not support the TMT to be developed anywhere on our Mauna. Negotiating a new site for it to be on a decommissioned site is not a resolution. It is a breach of trust and you will need to start the process all over again, inducing generational trauma all over again, having hard working families who contribute to our communities to take time that is already limited to petition BLNR, to petition SHPD, and all stakeholders (public governing departments, private corporations) who refuse to listen to the voices of our people who are saying

enough is enough, we demand that you folks honor the determinations by supreme court hearings rulings such as:

- 1. Pele Defense Fund vs Paty in which Wao O Kele O Puna land swap breached the public trust created under § 5(f) of the Hawai'i Admission Act (admission of Hawai'i to the Union) and article XII, § 4 of the Hawai'i Constitution, because the ceded lands were supposed to be held in trust for certain public uses (including the betterment of native Hawaiians).
- PDF also alleged violations of: article XII, § 7 of the Hawai'i Constitution (protecting traditional and customary native Hawaiian rights) and Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS) chapters 171 and 195 (governing public lands).
- Additionally, PDF claimed due process violations and exclusion of its members from access for traditional, cultural and subsistence uses. The rulings sided with Pele Defense Fund.
 - 1. Mauna Kea Aina Hou vs BLNR, Conservation District Use Permit (CDUP) to UHH for the construction of the TMT before holding a proper contested case hearing which they were found in the ruling to have violated due process. To disregard both findings of the Supreme Court would be UNWISE as you would be implying that we Kanaka Maoli and non- Hawaiians who oppose TMT development have no judicially enforceable rights under the public lands trust and that all entities, government departments of the State of Hawai'i has failed in their fiduciary obligations to uphold public trust regarding ceded land leases to corporations disregarding the voice of our people who oppose these leases seeking to protect the balance of what we have left to properly steward our Hawai'i
 - 2. Ching vs Case, we honor the late uncle Ku Ching and aunty Maxines fight which the supreme court ruled that the State breached its fiduciary/trust duties by failing to undertake reasonable monitoring/inspection of the leased land even though it was aware of possible risks (such as unexploded ordnance). Therefore This decision reinforces that the State's role as trustee of ceded lands is active, not passive: the fiduciary duty includes monitoring and ensuring that third-party uses of those lands (especially military leases) do not compromise the trust for native Hawaiians and the general public. Therefore, It provides precedent for asserting accountability of state agencies (DLNR/BLNR) in the context of ceded lands and the rights of native Hawaiians. I do not feel MKSOA is exempt from this ruling, and the establishment of MKSOA mandated by the State of Hawai'i holds your entity just as vulnerable to these breaches of trust if not more and liability just as relevant to any development on our Mauna whether it be TMT, Pōhakuloa and/or Geothermal which I oppose ALL desecration on our Mauna.

Furthermore, I'd like you to reflect on our first meeting with eachother which I brought my daughter Emma Kauaheikala'ipiliaumoe Pereira whose Piko was placed in our Lake Waiau in 2013 as our long lasting stance against desecration on our Mauna. I brought her to share her presence first and foremost and give her space if she was comfortable to share her story or mana'o at our community talk story night in Hilo last year. She is still getting Ma'a as she

observes how this all works. She regrets she cannot be at this meeting in person as she is attending Kula at Nāwahi today.

Emma and I discussed the proposed alternative site upon the Governors announcement, which she is in opposition to and is now coming of age to understand Native Hawaiian Customary Rights and Traditions which she stands by in the knowing of the signifance of her Piko on our Mauna as well as the Kūleana and honor it entails. She wanted me to share that with you all today. At such her young age we are practicing being present in these meetings together to hold each of you accountable whether in person or in spirit accompanied by written testimony. It therefore holds us accountable in the capacity we understand and have. I as her mother am learning and understanding more each day what this right entails in the realms of political and legal jargon hidden behind a smoke screen of historical decision making by public Trust entities made on lies and deceit. We seek to remedy this, Ho'oponopono this on a systemic level. A good start would be practicing our right as kanaka to just breathe and be who we are as Kānaka without having to fight for it to be recognized or taken to court for it to be upheld. She would like you to recognize this. I would like you to recognize this as we prioritize the psychosocial ramifications continuing to be inflicted and imposed on on our Keiki, youth, adults, Kūpuna and Ohana's who fight daily to gain back our kanaka identity, preserve our spiritual connection and protect our spirit from further desecration by allowing these developments to impede on who we are.

Lastly, This is all so very kahiko (old) as our kupuna have been presenting time and time again since 132 years of belligerent illegal occupation in our Hawai'i where in which our Queen was arrested for treason and had to stand down to protect our people in the knowing that one day our Hawai'i would be restored and Hawaiian Kingdom be reinstated. In which our Kūpuna signed the Ku'e Petition, thereby no Treaty Of Annexation exists.

Meanwhile we Will continue to stand with our Community and Kūpuna against all of these illegal land deals involving our F5 crown lands being exchanged without beneficiary consent, to include past and current proposals of land swaps, proposals of alternative sites on our Mauna to build TMT, allowing Pōhakuloa to be leased by the Military, entertaining Native to Native models of Geothermal development on DHHL/crown lands on our Mauna or any State F5 Lands held in trust which have no thorough inventory per OHA, any purchasing of private land wasting millions of tax dollars on purchases that in realty should not have been had which is rightfully ours to begin with.
