1. This would betray the will of Maui's people.

In 2022, the voters of Maui County spoke clearly: they created the East Maui Community Water Authority — a community-based body, born from hope and accountability — to steward the long-term care of East Maui's streams. This Authority, supported by the County administration, has been diligently preparing to take on this kuleana with integrity and vision. Rather than paving a path for a foreign corporation to retain control of our public trust waters, DLNR staff should be helping to realize the people's mandate — assisting in setting aside East Maui's diversion infrastructure to the Authority, and restoring community trust in our collective stewardship.

2. This ignores the heart of your mission.

The Land Board exists to protect Hawai'i's natural and cultural resources under the public trust. Yet, in East Maui, those responsibilities remain unmet.

Streams still run dry where restoration was ordered but never enforced. Millions of gallons vanish daily through unlined reservoirs that Mahi Pono — PSP Investments — refuses to repair. And the court-ordered contested case hearing, meant to address the harm to watershed health, native species, and Hawaiian rights, still awaits your attention.

How can we contemplate a 30-year lease when the basic promises of justice and restoration have yet to be fulfilled? Every drop that is diverted without resolution deepens a wound we have not yet healed.

3. This denies the truth of drought and climate reality.

Over the past five years, East Maui — like much of Hawai'i — has endured a deepening drought, one that has unfolded faster and harsher than anyone foresaw. There is no evidence that relief is coming soon.

To grant long-term control of these precious waters to a corporation whose farming practices not only ignore the changing climate, but ulitize harmful pesticides, is not only shortsighted, but reckless. It is negligent to gamble with our future when we do not know how much water will remain five years from now, let alone thirty.

I urge you: do not waste your limited time, staff, and resources attempting to appease a foreign corporation at the expense of the people, of Native Hawaiian communities, and of the 'āina itself.

Instead, please direct your staff to collaborate with the East Maui Community Water Authority — 'Aha Wai o Maui Hikina — to ensure that the care of East Maui's streams returns to the hands of those who live by them, depend on them, and cherish them. You know this is the right thing to do, I trust this message will be heard before it's too late.

DHHL respectfully requests a deferral of this item. This is substantially the same item proposed last year (D-4, November 8, 2024). We have not changed our position and incorporate our testimony here by reference. We continue to believe the proposal does not protect our water rights. In particular the action is being proposed prior to the Commission on Water Resource Management (CWRM) fully considering our pending water reservation request, filed in December of 2020. While the proposed draft lease acknowledges DHHL's request, this action is premature as it subverts established processes designed to protect DHHL water rights.

Last year's item was denied, consistent with our request and also to respect the newly established East Maui Water Authority and Mayor Bissen's request for negotiations to address public and private interests. DHHL respectfully requests the DLNR adhere to their previously stated intentions and commitments to support those efforts. Our representative on the 'Aha Wai o Maui Hikina has been diligently participating in those discussions.

While item D-10 does note a possible set aside to the County, we believe there is no right to a Contested Case Hearing (CCH) on a set aside, as opposed to a license. This indicates the only outcome that needs this proposed action is a long term license. As the most recent court ruling has made clear (Sierra Club v. Board of Land & Natural Resources), the 2026 proposed Revocable Permit will be subject to a CCH. That will allow a hearing "over relevant issues related to the best management of East Maui stream diversions" as is sought in item D-10

For the above reasons we respectfully request the Board to defer this item. If it does not defer, DHHL must be a party in the CCH.

One of Mahi Pono's stated objectives when the sale of the land was being contemplated was to enhance Maui's food security. Instead it seems to be maximizing returns for Canadian pensioners. And it's lack of transparency is egregious.

Please do not waste your limited staff and financial resources on a misguided attempt to appease a foreign corporation's interests over that of the public, Native Hawaiian communities, and all who have a stake in our islands' environmental integrity, democracy, and dignity. Please reject the staff proposal to move forward with the process for a long-term lease to PSP Investments/Mahi Pono, and please instead ask your staff to work with the East Maui Community Water Authority/'Aha Wai o Maui Hikina, to facilitate their administration of East Maui's diversion infrastructure via a set-aside or similar disposition.

My name is Shay Chan Hodges. I am a Maui resident and former Chair of the Maui County Water Board.

Mahi Pono Holdings' sole owner is the Canadian Public Sector Pension Investment Board (PSP), a Crown Corporation with \$214 billion in assets that invests the pension funds of Canadian government workers. James Infantino, the National Pension Officer for the union representing those workers, warned the East Maui Water Authority Board in September 2024: "Don't let PSP investments anywhere near this long-term lease."

Though the union's 240,000 members are impacted financially by PSP's investments, they do not support PSP's extractive corporate ownership model, which includes, for example, the controversial privatization of water infrastructure in Australia's Murray-Darling Basin in 2020 -- during a catastrophic drought and fire season. PSP is now Australia's largest almond grower in the world's second-largest almond-producing region outside of California. Almonds are a highly water-intensive crop and farmers were calling for an almond moratorium last year.

In Toronto, tenants of PSP's buildings endured years of sub-standard conditions until finally reaching a settlement two months ago favoring tenant health and repairs after a two-year rent strike and prolonged legal struggle. And last year, Minnesota's Attorney General obtained a \$4 million settlement against HavenBrook Homes, a PSP-owned rental company, for gross neglect and deception affecting over 600 families—including cases involving lead exposure and disregard for COVID protections.

And when I testified before you 11 months ago, I described how Thames Water had been fined a record £104 million for dumping sewage into UK rivers and a criminal investigation over severe pollution and mismanagement, due to years of private ownership, including investment by another Canadian pension fund -- OMERS. Just two weeks ago, the Guardian reported that Thames Water is on the brink of financial collapse due to huge debts built up over two decades by owners who have been criticized for paying out dividends without investing enough in its leaking pipes and malfunctioning treatment works.

OMERS and PSP's exploitive and destructive strategies are not unusual for Canadian Pension funds. And it is not surprising that our Maui community's experiences with PSP/Mahi Pono are consistent with the experiences in Australia, Toronto, Minnesota, and the United Kingdom.

On Maui, we know that corporate ownership means deferred maintenance, extractive practices, and harmful environmental and cultural impacts. Because of this, hundreds of Maui residents from Nahiku to Kula attended East Maui Water Authority community meetings in June and October and worked together to design stewardship models rooted in transparency, kuleana, and resilience. These models measure success by healthy ecosystems, eradication of invasives, multigenerational knowledge transfer, and local food security, not corporate profits or overseas pension dividends.

The choice is clear: stand with those who have shown true stewardship of our land and water or invite further harm by siding with profit-driven foreign interests.

Please reject the staff proposal to move forward with the process for a long-term lease to PSP Investments/Mahi Pono, and please instead ask your staff to work with the East Maui Community Water Authority/'Aha Wai o Maui Hikina, to facilitate their administration of East Maui's diversion infrastructure via a set-aside or similar disposition.

Aloha e Chair Chang and Members of the Board of Land and Natural Resources,

Mahalo for the opportunity to testify. My name is Kēhaunani Springer, and I am kanaka 'ōiwi researcher and practitioner who has worked alongside East Maui communities for over a decade, supporting their nearshore and coastal fisheries efforts. Because of these relationships and kuleana, I **STRONGLY OPPOSE** Agenda Item D-10.

The proposal to initiate a 30-year lease of East Maui streams to Pomona Farming LLC and PSP Investments, a Canada-based pension fund now operating as Mahi Pono, contradicts the intent of Maui voters who established the 'Aha Wai o Maui Hikina to ensure community-based water governance, not foreign corporate control.

- 1. A contested case hearing is unnecessary and will harm, not help East Maui. The impacts of stream diversion have already been documented and litigated for decades. Reopening settled issues wastes time, delays restoration, and prolongs corporate control.
- 2. Existing obligations remain unmet. Court-ordered streamflow restoration, monitoring, and enforcement are still incomplete. Many streams remain severely dewatered, harming ecosystems and practices essential to East Maui farmers and families.
- 3. A 30-year lease is irresponsible in a climate crisis. Drought, changing rainfall, and unstable hydrology make long-term water commitments to a private investment fund dangerous and contrary to the public trust.
- 4. BLNR must uphold the public trust and voter intent. Maui County voters chose community-based management under the 'Aha Wai o Maui Hikina. The State should support, not undermine that transition.

Why This Matters: Mauka to Makai Health

The restoration of continuous streamflow from mauka to makai is essential for:

- Fisheries health, including recruitment of 'o'opu, 'opae, hihiwai, and other diadromous species;
- Nearshore ecosystem resilience, as freshwater input influences sediment transport, nutrient cycling, and reef vitality;
- Kalo cultivation and cultural life, which depend on clean, abundant wai;
- The integrity of our ahupua'a systems, whose balance is founded on unbroken freshwater flow.

I have seen firsthand how restored streamflow breathes life back into lo'i systems, muliwai estuaries, and nearshore fisheries. East Maui families carry generations of knowledge about these waters, knowledge that cannot be replaced by corporate decision-making.

Conclusion

Wai is life, genealogy, and public trust. It is not a commodity to be secured by offshore investment funds. East Maui communities have fought for generations to restore stream flow, protect traditional practices, and reclaim governance of their watersheds. Advancing a 30-year lease works against these efforts and undermines both law and pono stewardship.

For these reasons, I respectfully urge you to **reject Agenda Item D-10** and support a pathway that honors community governance, public trust responsibilities, and the health of East Maui's streams.

Written testimony on Agenda Item D. 10. Board's Decision-Making regarding the Koolau Forest Reserve, Island of Maui

Dear Members of the Board,

My name is Randon Valenciano and I am a student at the William S. Richardson School of Law pursuing the field of administrative law. Although this case pertains to issues on a different island than where I live, water rights are not an exclusive concern to Maui, and I appreciate the opportunity to engage in a statewide concern.

I submit this comment regarding the Board's decision-making on whether to hold a contested case hearing over a proposed water license by public auction or if the water rights should be set aside via the Governor's Executive Order. My comment specifically addresses procedural reasons in support of holding a contested case hearing.

Constitutional Mandate

Article XI, Section 1 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i provides that "for the benefit of present and future generations, the State . . .shall conserve and protect Hawai'i's. . . natural resources, including. . .water. . . and shall promote the development and utilization of these resources in a manner consistent with their conservation and in furtherance of the self-sufficiency of the state." Section 7 further establishes that the "The State has an obligation to protect, control and regulate the use of Hawai'i's water resources for the benefit of its people."

These constitutional mandates define this Board's statutory responsibilities. But in effect, the broad language leaves a lot of discretion to the agency to make interpretations to carry out their duty.

Limits of Agency Deference

Historically, when legislative intent is unclear, there was deference to the agency's interpretation of the statutory mandate due to a recognition of their subject-matter expertise.

However, in *Loper Bright Enterprises v. Raimondo*, 603 U.S. 369 (2024), the U.S. Supreme Court overruled *Chevron U.S.A. v. NRDC*, 467 U.S. 837 (1984), and held that agency interpretations should no longer be given controlling deference. Rather, an agency's decisions may be persuasive but are still subject to independent review. Given this shift in federal administrative law, this Board should reasonably anticipate that any decision reached in this matter may be subject to appeal.

Benefits of a Contested Case Hearing

A contested case hearing benefits all parties as it provides a fair opportunity to present evidence, offer arguments, and be fully heard. This involvement promotes public confidence in the process and increases the likelihood that the parties will accept the result, thereby reducing the possibility of further litigation.

This choice would also benefit the BLNR as they will have access to a complete evidentiary record and can base their decision on the merits of the case. This rational connection helps support the defensibility of their decision and promotes efficiency because the agency can potentially resolve the dispute themselves. Even if an appeal is later pursued, the evidentiary record will significantly reduce the costs and delays of subsequent proceedings.

Conclusion

In re Water Use Permits Applications, 94 Haw. 97, 189 (2000), the Hawai'i Supreme Court held that their decision was rendered with "utmost care, balancing due deference to the Commission's judgment with a level of scrutiny necessitated by the ultimate importance of these matters to the present and future generations of our state."

By choosing to hold a contested case hearing, the Board of Land and Natural Resources will fulfill their constitutional duty to manage Hawai'i's natural resources while also remaining fair and transparent.
