O wau o Brigitte Leilani Axelrode or Gigi and I am a recent graduate w my MA in political science from UHM. I currently reside here on oahu but my mookuauhau is tied to Maui and part of my ohana still resides there. I'm here today to urge you to NOT accept the staff recommendation to move forward with any process that considers giving Mahi Pono, a.k.a. PSP Investments, a long-term lease for East Maui's streams, for the following reasons:

1.. This directly contradicts the clearly expressed will of Maui County voters. In the 2022 elections, the people of Maui chose to establish a community-based East Maui Community Water Authority to assume long-term stewardship of East Maui's streams. On October 29th, I attended a community meeting in Ha'ikū held by the East Maui Water Authority, where they engaged with the needs of residents in a process grounded in mutual agreement, transparency, and respect.

following this example- Please assist the Authority—and do not create a pathway for a foreign corporation to maintain private control over our wai. These resources must serve the lineal descendants, residents, and the communities who rely on them—not a corporation.

2. This overlooks urgent responsibilities fundamental to your mission. The Land Board is the primary agency charged with upholding the public trust in Hawai'i's natural and cultural resources. Yet in East Maui, that trust has been repeatedly violated—these violations include: the ongoing failure to implement Water Commission—ordered stream restoration; the decades-long loss of millions of gallons of water each day through unlined reservoirs that Mahi

Pono/PSP Investments still refuses to line; and the unresolved, court-ordered contested case hearing needed to address the upcoming 2026 revocable permit for Mahi Pono/PSP Investments.

3. This advances a narrative that ignores the reality of our worsening drought. As you are well aware, East Maui—and all of Hawai'i—has endured a rapidly intensifying drought that has far outpaced every projection.

Reject the staff proposal to advance a long-term lease for PSP Investments/Mahi Pono. Instead, collaborate with the East Maui Community Water Authority/'Aha Wai o Maui Hikina to facilitate their management of East Maui's diversion infrastructure through a set-aside or comparable mechanism.

The key is that these are organizations that are working alongside the community and care about the long-term wellbeing of Maui- something that should be this department's main concern as well.

Please don't allow our public resources to be privatized by foreign investors.

Aloha Chair Chang and Members of the Board of Land and Natural Resources,

I urge you **not** to accept DLNR's recommendation to pursue any process that advances a long-term water lease for Mahi Pono/PSP Investments in East Maui.

First, in the DLNR's own Recommendation to initiate a contested case, it states: "...the Board initiates on its own a contested case hearing with relevant parties over relevant issues related to the **best management** of East Maui stream..." (pg. 2).

If "best management" is truly the objective, then PSP Investments—a private Canadian investment firm—cannot meet that standard. Their record already shows this; for example, they have refused to line reservoirs that capture the water they divert. This is far from "excellent, effective, desirable quality, or of the highest degree" of stewardship. No foreign investment company will ever know, mālama, or manage Hawai'i's waters better than the people of this place.

Kalo farmers, in particular, embody what real water management looks like. Their relationship with wai is intimate, daily, and rooted in deep knowledge of the kahawai, po'owai, 'auwai, makawai, ho'i wai, kuauna, and the surrounding ecosystem from mauka to makai. They observe, maintain, and care for the water not just for their own benefit, but for the entire community.

Who is best suited to manage our streams? Those who see, smell, touch, taste, and understand the wai every day—or a corporation whose representatives may never set foot in these streams, whose diversions send water into distant pipes and reservoirs, divorced from the responsibility of caring for its source? If the Board seeks true, community-rooted, culturally grounded water resource management, then 'Aha Wai Maui Hikina is the most qualified and appropriate steward.

Secondly, the public trust doctrine requires the State to **protect and provide for the maximum, beneficial use of water for the public**, not private corporations. The BLNR, the State, and Governor Josh Green all share this constitutional duty. Yet this proposal offers no real assurance that the public trust will be protected; instead, it signals preference for a private entity.

Under the public trust, any balancing between public and private uses must **begin with a presumption in favor of the public**. This recommendation does the opposite. At a time when Hawai'i's water resources are limited and increasingly threatened, the State should be prioritizing protection, restoration, and sustainable, community-based use—not accelerating water allocations for corporate interests. The current trajectory makes clear: if we continue investing in private water leases at this rate, we risk a future where neither public nor private users have sufficient water at all.

Is that the future you desire?

My name is **Brandon Maka'awa'awa**, Vice President of the **Nation of Hawai'i**, residing on the island of O'ahu. I submit this testimony in **strong opposition** to Agenda Item D-10.

Granting a contested case hearing would only prolong and legitimize a process that should never have advanced this far. Mahi Pono—a foreign corporation jointly owned by California-based Trinitas Partners and the Canadian Public Sector Pension Investment Board (PSP Investments)—seeks to lock in decades-long control over the majority of Maui's diverted stream water. This is not stewardship; it is corporate colonization of a public trust resource.

In 2022, the people of Maui County spoke clearly at the ballot box, **overwhelmingly voting** to establish the **East Maui Water Authority** through a charter amendment. That vote was a mandate: **Maui's water must be managed in a pono way—by and for the people of Maui**, not by foreign investors whose primary obligation is to distant shareholders.

A contested case hearing is **not** the path to justice. It is a procedural delay that risks entrenching corporate control while draining public resources and exhausting community capacity. Aloha e Chair Chang and Member of the Board,

On behalf of the County of Maui, I am submitting this testimony in opposition to Item D-10, which recommends holding a contested case hearing over the proposed disposition of a 30-year water license for East Maui. This direction disregards critical progress made over the past year and threatens to derail a collaborative process this Board itself encouraged Maui County to pursue.

Over the past year, the County of Maui, the East Maui Water Authority, and Mahi Pono have taken steady, intentional steps to rebuild trust and work toward a long-term solution for East Maui's water. These conversations have not been easy, nor should they be rushed. Since negotiations began, the parties have held ongoing meetings. The process has not been perfect, but it is the first time in decades that we are all engaging directly and working together with Maui's best interest in mind.

For generations, East Maui communities — especially Native Hawaiian farmers, kalo growers, and long-time residents — have navigated significant challenges related to water access and stewardship. These longstanding issues will take time and continued commitment to work through. We are finally at a place where the parties are talking honestly, working to identify solutions, and building trust.

In East Maui, this is not an abstract policy matter. It is personal, emotional, and rooted in generations of lived experience. Pushing a contested case at this moment risks deepening divisions at a time when the community is finally working toward a shared solution.

Maui's future depends on a strong agricultural sector, and Mahi Pono plays a critical role in keeping our lands productive and our island more food secure.

Their employees are our neighbors, our family, and our friends, and their success is directly connected to Maui's future. While some may view the contested case as a means to protect interests, there remains a clear and viable path through continued negotiation — and I believe Mahi Pono's leadership sees that path as well.

A contested case comes with unintended consequences, including delays, added costs, and the risk of deepening community divisions. The issues before us extend far beyond legal procedure; they involve culture, history, relationships, and community well-being.

I respectfully remind the Board of Chair Chang's statement last year when this same item was withdrawn. She noted that withdrawal was necessary "to respect the newly established local water authority on Maui" and to support long-term partnerships that serve both public and private interests. She also shared that she heard "heartfelt comments" from the community seeking a mutually beneficial path that ensures water for future generations. Those values have not changed — and the parties are finally making the progress those comments envisioned.

Over the past year, the East Maui Water Authority has become established and is now working closely with the community. All parties continue to engage in active, good-faith negotiations with a shared commitment to move forward collaboratively. There is also no legal requirement under HAR § 13-1-28 to initiate a contested case, and the Board itself previously obtained a stay on a similar proceeding. Initiating another now would be inconsistent with both the law and the spirit of the Board's own prior actions.

This decision and its consequences are best understood and addressed back home on Maui. We agreed to maintain the status quo for another year to ensure uninterrupted service while negotiations continue. All we ask for is the time and space to finish the work this Board supported us in beginning last year. No one can reasonably expect an issue of this magnitude to be resolved in a single year. We can only move at the speed of trust.

In closing, I ask the Board to stand with Maui County once again and support us in continuing this work through a collaborative and inclusive approach. Our community deserves that chance. Our progress depends on it.

Dear Chair Chang and Members of the Board of Land and Natural Resources,

My name is Mavis Iwalani Oliveira-Medeiros and I am urging you to reject any process that contemplates a Contested Case Hearing or granting Mahi Pono/PSP Investments — including its subsidiary EMI — a long-term lease for East Maui's public trust waters.

1. This violates the will of Maui's voters.

In 2022, Maui County voters voted to create the East Maui Community Water Authority specifically to assume long-term administration of East Maui's streams. The county, the Mayor, and the Water Authority have all been preparing for this kuleana.

The Hawaii Public Trust Doctrine — reaffirmed in Waiahole I & II — requiring the State to prioritize traditional and customary practices, not private corporate control. Staff resources should be assisting the Authority with a set-aside of diversion infrastructure, not clearing a path for a foreign investment corporation to hold East Maui's water for another 30 years.

2. Public trust violations remain unresolved.

Before any lease is even discussed, the Board must address the long-standing breaches of trust in East Maui:

- Streams still running dry despite Court orders to restore them, not from this years drought, but many years before that.
- Millions of gallons lost daily through unlined reservoirs of Mahi Pono, still hasn't lined; more getting lost in poorly maintained tunnels & diversions.
- Address the negative impacts on watershed health, native species, and Traditional & Customary practices.

Under Kelly v. 1250 Oceanside Partners and Waiahole, the State must show a "high degree of protection" for public trust resources — not advance a discretionary long-term lease while clear harms persist.

3. The climate crisis demands caution, not corporate certainty.

East Maui is already experiencing severe, accelerating drought. Granting a 30-year water lease when we do not know what the next 5 years will look like is reckless. Private agricultural

plans cannot outweigh the need to preserve water for kalo growers, ecosystems, cultural practices, during worsening climate extremes.

My Personal Connection

I was partially raised in the East Maui Koʻolau area — in Nāhiku and 'Ulaino — where my 'ohana grew watercress and harvested hīhīwai, 'oʻopu, 'ōpae, and prawns from the 'Ulaino muliwai, and from Makapipi and Waiohue streams. In the 1960s, before heavy diversions, our rivers ran full and clean. I remember when we first noticed the ponds not filling and the streams running low — the life in our waters was disappearing and our Mom was in shock, like it was a bad omen. At the time, no one knew what was happening upstream. No longer could she & our Dad take us there to collect food. I wasn't even a teen-ager yet, but today I realize that, that one act by A&B to just divert our streams to water their sugarcane, as if none of our lives mattered, has taken away 3 generations of our traditional & customary rights. And it's not just our family, it's hundreds of families, thousands of Kanaka Maoli.

Today, every time we make that long and winding road trip to Wailuku — passing all 54 bridges and streams, sometimes 2–4 times each month — we see invasive grasses, shrubs and trees choking streambeds that used to run with water. These streams have been so starved that even the vegetation tells the story of neglect.

It is also deeply concerning that EMI used chemical sprays — often appearing to be herbicides along the access roads leading up to their diversions. Whatever the product is, spraying chemicals into steep watershed areas above our food sources and native stream life is unsafe, irresponsible, and entirely inconsistent with the duties of a public trust user. If Mahi Pono wants long-term control, they should first demonstrate responsible long-term care to the streams and infrastructure.

This constant, visible harm is why East Maui needs stewardship rooted in kuleana and not corporate profit.

Final Request

Please reject the staff recommendation to begin any long-term lease process for Mahi Pono/PSP Investments/EMI.

Instead, direct staff to work with the East Maui Community Water Authority / 'Aha Wai o Maui Hikina to facilitate a set-aside or similar disposition that returns the management of East Maui's streams to a truly public, locally accountable entity — consistent with Hawai'i's Constitution, case law, and the will of Maui's voters.

Mahalo nui for your time, your kuleana, and your commitment to Hawai'i's Public Trust.

Aloha Chair Chang and Members of the Land Board,

'O Hi'ialoaKahekili Palakiko ko'u inoa. Noho au ma ka 'awawa 'o Kaua'ula ma Maui (My name is Hi'ialoKahekili Palakiko. I live in the valley of Kaua'ula on Maui) and I am writing this testimony for my lāhui and the next generation that comes after me.

For too long, our wai across kou Hawai'i pae 'āina has been mistreated and mismanaged by the private sector claiming to care for our precious resources and the Hawaiian way of life. In Hawaiian history and culture, Hawaiians understood the importance of our water system on each island, which created the 'Ahupua'a system allowing every living thing access to water. Water would flow from Maui to Makai which benefited every aquifer and maintained a lush environment. Water was not meant to be owned by anyone during that time as it was and still is a resource that one must have to survive in this world.

However, due to greed and corruption, many want to try and claim our wai as theirs not for the sake of our Lahui but for their own personal gain. Personally, I have seen the damages that come with allowing private developers control of our wai and it is time to huli the system. Right now the County of water supply here on Maui has declared various water shortage stages and locals here on the island are told to conserve water while private sectors continue to pull water from our streams for their own personal gain. How is that pono! When you look at west Maui, it is obvious that the lack of water is affecting our community and continues to create a dangerous environment for all who live on the island.

If we continue to allow these private companies to abuse our water resources, what is stopping them from running our streams dry and being in the same situation as us in West Maui. Allowing companies to reduce stream flow will not just hurt our ecosystems but affect traditional agriculture (like kalo farming) as well as cultural practices. As a Native Hawaiian, I am concerned about the next generation and the "public trust"- water from streams which is supposed to serve many interests (cultural, downstream users, and the ecosystems), not just large scale agriculture.

As I drive up Haleakala highway, it is very hurtful that big private companies are able to use our water but Kalo farmers like myself are forced to fight for wai due to companies taking more of the water they need. Stream flows are deeply tied to cultural and traditional practices and diverting too much water can hurt our ability to maintain lo'i (taro patches). History has shown that private companies do not take into consideration the public trust creating a long term risk to our community by using more groundwater during dry periods which depletes our aquifers, threatening future supplies for everyone.

It is time to think about the public's interest instead of thinking about how one may gain more income in their pockets. As you folks read more testimonies, I hope you folks think about the lāhui and its future. Lets make the right step in charging our aquifers and allow Mauka to Makai stream flow.

My name is Princeton Yamaguchi I'm a native Hawaiian and Maui resident I strongly urge you NOT to accept staff recommendations to move forward with any process that contemplates giving MAHI PONO also known as PSP investments a long-term lease for East Maui streams.

DO THE RIGHT THING FOR THE PEOPLE NOT FOR THE MONEY

Thousands of citrus trees grown with synthetic pesticides and fertilizers does not help with food security. This type of agriculture, depletes water resources pollute the environment and leaves behind trash and pollution.

The negative impacts of stream diversion on the ecosystem are numerous.

- Native stream life declines: 'O'opu (native gobies), 'ōpae, and hihiwai rely on continuous mauka-to-makai flow; diversions disrupt their life cycles.
- Warmer, stagnant water: Reduced flow heats quickly in Hawai'i's sun, stressing native species and encouraging invasive fish and algae.
- Habitat loss: Streamside plants, native birds, and amphibians lose the moist, healthy riparian zones they depend on.
- Blocked migration: Many Hawaiian freshwater species must move upstream and downstream throughout their lives. Diversions and ditches stop this movement.

On the Ocean & Nearshore Waters

- Weakened estuaries: Heavily diverted streams reduce freshwater reaching the ocean, harming fish nurseries and limu beds.
- Limu decline: Many limu depend on the balance between freshwater and saltwater. Less stream flow can kill native limu and favor invasives.
- Coral stress: Changes in salinity and reduced natural sediment flow can weaken nearshore reefs already stressed by warming and runoff.
- Loss of cultural resources: Lower stream flow affects gathering of native

species and impacts traditional practices like loi kalo (taro patches) and loko i'a (fishpond) health.
